

Suds Sweep Two Games From Bevos

Seattle Cuts Bevos' Lead To Four Games By Taking Five Out Of Six Tussles

Seattle's larruping Rainiers, almost woefully out of the running a week ago for the 1945 Pacific coast league flag, were back in the thick of the fight today after taking the first-place Portland Beavers over the hurdles five tilts out of six in a series to be concluded tonight.

Suds Pull Up
The Rainiers pulled within four games of the pacesetters by sweeping a Sunday twin bill 6-2 and 5-2 after dropping Saturday's encounter 11-3.

San Francisco's Seals took a firm grip on fourth place three games in front of Oakland by beating the Acorns three times over the weekend, copping Saturday's game 4-0 behind big Bob Joyce and grabbing both ends of yesterday's doubleheader 7-4 and 8-2.

San Diego moved within three games of the Oaks by shading the Sacramento Solons four out of seven, winning Saturday 4-3 and splitting Sunday's double header 4-2 and 2-9.

Hollywood recouped after a bad start against the Los Angeles Angels to break even 4-4 in their series. The Stars took three straight during the weekend, slaughtering the Seraphs 18-0 Saturday and continuing yesterday 7-3 and 8-1 to draw within two games of seventh place.

Suds Shell Purford
Seattle beat Portland's leading pitcher, Don Purford, in yesterday's curtain raiser with Southey Glen Elliott getting credit for the win. The Beavers got off to an early two-run lead in the first frame on Frank Demaree's homer with one aboard, but were unable to score in the succeeding innings. The Rainiers sent Purford to the showers in the seventh with a four-run rally touched off by Charley Aleno's circuit clout, and then added two more in the ninth off relief hurler Ad Liska.

San Francisco's 4-0 shutout Saturday was win No. 25 for Joyce.

In Sunday's opener the Seals were trailing 4-1 when they drove Mitch Chetkovich off the mound in the eighth to knot the count and clinched the game with three more in the ninth. Frank Seward tossed six-hit ball to take the afterpiece 8-2.

Ken Keltner Will Lead Fleet City Bluejackets Against Klamath Marines

A baseball treat of real pre-war big league caliber is in store for Klamath Falls diamond fans next Wednesday afternoon when the Fleet City Bluejackets, San Francisco outfit and probably the best nine on the west coast this year, meet the local marine squad.

This game will be played at Recreation park and is slated to begin at 5:30 p. m., to allow civilian fans a chance to attend.

Not much is known of the Bluejackets' record this season except that they have topped every service and civilian team in the San Francisco area and are bringing to Klamath Falls a terrific California reputation.

Holding down the second sack for the navy boys is Ken Keltner, Cleveland Indian third baseman for seven years, who hit fifth high among American league batsmen his last year in the big show.

On third base will be Bob Kahle, late of Hollywood, who was rated the top third sacker in the Pacific Coast league. An indication of his ability can be seen in the fact that Keltner, who was the American league's number one man at the hot corner, is shifted to second to make room for Kahle in the Bluejacket lineup.

Joe Abreu, who has seen service in three class AA loops as well as a spell at second for the Cincinnati Reds, has the navy shortstop spot, and Floyd Turner, former Texas leaguer, rounds out the infield at first base.

These four men, along with George Schmees and Harvey Storey in the outfield, have been pounding the ball for an overall .390 clip this season.

Expected to hurl against the Leathernecks is a former well-known collegiate grid star, Ed (Special Delivery) Jones of Pittsburgh football fame a few years back.

Wednesday's tilt will be the acid test of the season for the marines, who have been flying high with a 14-game winning streak over local opposition.
