Should the Klamath Indians Receive FULL CITIZENSHIP?

The Klamath Indians have been wards of the government for eighty-one years; their property and money politically controlled.

S. 1313. A Bill introduced by Senators Morse and Gordon of Oregon, will confer full citizenship upon the Indians of the Klamath Reservation. The progressive Indians of the Reservation and prominent citizens of Klamath county endorse the principles involved in the Bill.

The Bill carries out the recommendations of the report of House Resolution 166, 78th Congress, 2nd Session, and Senate Report No. 310 of the 78th Congress, 1st Session. The House Report recommends to the Congress:

"However, your committee does feel that the time has come when a procedure should be enacted into legislation whereby the individual American Indian who has the capacity and desire to move from his special status into the realm of full citizenship should be permitted to do so upon presentation of his request and a demonstration of his ability to free himself from the restrictions and privileges of his special status."

Senate Report No. 310 recommends to the Congress:

"Put the supervision of Indian forests under the National Forest Administration.

"Eliminate federal trust over all individual Indian lands, including those in inheritance status. This will free the Indian owners to become responsible citizens, neither in handicapped nor in preferred status. It will enable them to take their places in their communities without the stigma that attaches to them in either status, and will at the same time free the communities to build up through the contributions and to the advantage of all their people. This will eliminate a large item in the administration of Indian property, and save the government several million dollars."

For the fiscal year 1946, the taxes paid by the Indians of the Klamath Reservation to the federal government for Reservation administration is \$321,000, a per capita cost of \$214.00.

Should the Klamath Indians Receive FULL CITIZENSHIP?

Superintendent Courtwright's report as of March 31, 1944, states:

"For over fifty years the Klamaths have dressed and lived like their white neighbors. All speak read and write English... Their children attend the public and other schools.

"Generally speaking, the Klamaths live much above the average of other Indians in the United States and, to some degree, better than their white neighbors... They dress like white people, their homes are modern, most with electric current, waterworks and sewer systems; equipped with modern labor-saving devices. They own many of the latest types of farm and ranch equipment such as tractors, trucks, balers, etc. and own the better grade of livestock."

The Klamath Indians have bought over \$100,000.00 in War Bonds; they work in defense plants. They have fought for freedom and democracy in the two World Wars. They have fought and died for their country. They have proven they are 100 per cent Americans. They are citizens in every respect except their property right which is now politically mismanaged by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The taxation by the Bureau of Indian Affairs of the capital receipts of their land and monies amounts to usurpation of their property. The American Indian does not enjoy the rights and privileges of the American Japanese.
