Forest Grove To Boost Rates

FOREST GROVE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Forest Grove residents may have to pay higher water rates to offset an estimated \$10,000 fire damage to the watershed, city officials said today.

An ordinance now being drawn up would boost the rates about 50 cents monthly per customer.

Fire crews yesterday checked an outbreak which threatened unburned timber in the watershed. Additional loggers and troops have been dispatched to the region, where the blaze now smolders behind fire lines.

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NEW JAP RULER SEEN AS ABLE TO HALT FIGHT

PITTSFIELD, Mass., Aug. 18 (AP)—A Pittsfield missionary who spent 14 years in Nagoya believes that the new premier of Japan, Prince Naruhiko Higashi-Kuni, "a hardboiled and heavy drinking character," will be able to handle the Japanese military situation and halt fighting on all fronts.

The Rev. Floyd L. Roberts, pastor of the South Congregational church, said in an interview last night that he lived on the same street as the premier, and that this uncle of Emperor Hirohito's wife is a disciplinarian who will be very impatient with Japanese military stuffed shirts.

Roberts said he believed Higashi-Kuni will have little trouble with generals, but pointed out that military leaders in smaller commands usually do not consult their superiors before ordering an attack.

Because of this, he added, it may almost become necessary "to whisper into the ear of every buck private in the army to surrender."

Grand Jury Returns Murder Indictments

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—The Multnomah county grand jury has returned second degree murder indictments against Jeptha N. Thompson, 39, and Otto Johnson, 31.

Thompson is accused of fatally beating Harry Brown in an altercation at Guilds lake housing project April 8. Johnson, Pittsburgh, Pa., negro, is charged with stabbing Ina Mae Blackwell, negro rooming house proprietress, June 14.

Messages south of Hong Kong will be delivered by British, Australian and Netherlands Red Cross representatives.
