TACOMA MAN HELD IN STUDENT KILLING

SEATTLE, Aug. 20 (AP)—Edward E. Mitchell of Tacoma has confessed he fired the shots which killed Walter B. Foley Jr., 22, Chief Deputy Prosecutor John J. Kinnett said Saturday.

Foley was a University of Washington student and former under-cover agent for the state liquor control board.

Kinnett quoted Mitchell as saying he and another man took Foley for a ride intending to "pistol whip" him for demanding a shake-down bribe.

He said Mitchell asserted he shot Foley when Foley reached for a pocket as if to draw a gun. The weapon was thrown into Commencement bay from Tacoma's 11th street bridge, Mitchell was quoted as saying.

Mitchell, 27, previously had admitted being present when Foley was shot but insisted another man did the shooting, Kinnett said.

SANTA ANA, Calif.—1st Lt. Earl B. Kent, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Kent, 737 Pacific Terrace, Klamath Falls, is currently assigned to the AAF redistribution station No. 4, at Santa Ana army air base.

Lt. Kent, a B-24 navigator in the 15th air force with 36 combat missions to his credit, entered the service on May 12, 1942 and went overseas in November, 1944. He is entitled to wear the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf clusters and the European theater ribbon with four battle stars.

At this redistribution station, an operation of the personal distribution command, combat returnees of the AAF receive complete medical examinations, classification interviews and reassignment to domestic stations of the army air forces.

Rachuy, Shevlin, Ore., and Gene Mitchell, electrician's mate, 2/c, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Waldrip, Tulelake, Calif., were aboard this heavy cruiser when she hurled more than 150,000 tons of projectiles at enemy planes, ships and land emplacements off Okinawa.

Veteran of major invasions from Guadalcanal to Okinawa, the Salt Lake City's 5-and-8-inch guns pounded the island by day and remained on the alert to repel Jap suicide attacks by night.

SERVES IN PACIFIC ABOARD THE USS BIRMINGHAM IN THE PACIFIC—Orvall Ray Mollett, S 1/c, USNR, husband of Jeanne Louise Mollett, Klamath Falls, Ore., serves aboard this ship which can look back on 121,500 miles of fighting the axis from the invasion of Sicily to the battle of Okinawa.

Tacoma Strike Vote Explained

TACOMA, Aug. 20 (AP)—The forthcoming strike vote of the Tacoma district Lumber and Sawmill Workers' Union (AFL) was explained to between 500 and 600 of the district's 4000 members at a meeting here yesterday, but no action taken.

Kenneth Gordon, business agent for the district, which includes plants in Tacoma, Puyallup and Sumner, said the vote will be handled by mail, votes having to be in by August 29.

Union officials here expected the proposed strike if the requested 20 cents per hour wage increase is turned down by the war labor board, Gordon said.
