Not a la hereby given that the Forest Service plans for the furtherance of the war effort, to sell to the Finney Logging Company of Klamath Falls, Oregon, without competition, as authorized under the First War Powers Act and at the appraised rates stated below, the timber hereinafter described. All persons having a legitimate interest should file a claim that interest with the Regional Forester, Box 417, Portland 8, Oregon, not later than August 20, 1945.

**LOCATION AND AMOUNT** All the merchantable timber, live or dead, marked for cutting on about 2000 acres of National Forest land in two units as indicated on a map attached to the timber sale agreement. # INDUSTRY TO RELIEVE WAR PLANT JOBLESS

SALEM, Aug. 20 (AP)—The state unemployment compensation commission said today that a "fair proportion" of persons laid off by war industries will be able to get jobs immediately in lumbering, transportation and food processing industries.

"Because of V-J Day coming in the midst of Oregon's busiest season," the commission said, "the unemployment load probably will not reach its height for several months."

"The unemployment service has listed thousands of jobs with canneries, railroads, lumber and logging firms and other industries. They are prepared to offer work in accord with the displaced person's skill and experience."

The commission advised that workers should accept the best jobs available, even though the pay might be a little less.

The commission now has almost \$73,000,000 to pay unemployment benefits, which range from \$10 to \$18 a week for from five to 20 weeks in any year.

The number of Americans under 25 years of age who are drowned each year is the equivalent of the normal complement of 30 U. S. navy destroyers.
