

## WORK BEGINS ON TULELAKE HOUSING UNIT

TULELAKE—The ground was broken this morning in preparation for the construction of a six-unit apartment building to be used by teachers of Tulelake schools. The building, which will include one unit of four three-room apartments, one unit of two four-room apartments, a series of six garages and a modern laundry, will go up on two lots in the middle residential addition across the east-west road from the high school.

Earl Barnum, Dunsuir contractor, is erecting the building. The emergency action on the building program became necessary when it was revealed by the Siskiyou joint high school board that several teachers' contracts had been cancelled as investigation proved that there were no housing accommodations available for families. The group of buildings will partly enclose a patio-type area, and will be of frame with concrete foundation. They will be equipped with space heaters. Immediate construction was made possible because priority was obtained previously under a building program that includes plans for 38 homes. Several of them have already been completed. The new buildings will cost approximately \$25,000. Teachers will be forced to find other accommodations during the first few weeks of the school term. Anyone having a house or room available is asked to call a member of the school board. Opening of the high school is scheduled for September 10 and it is expected that the elementary schools will resume classes September 4.

## NO INQUEST SLATED IN SAILOR DROWNING

No inquest will be held in the death of Andrew Yesko, 21, sailor who accidentally plunged to his death in the waters of the main canal from the railing of the 11th street bridge Sunday night, County Coroner George Adler said today. A joint civil investigation has been completed by the district attorney's office, city police, and the coroner. No evidence was found that Yesko was thrown into the canal in connection with a birthday celebration and the fact that he fell into the water from the railing of the bridge was substantiated. At the time the fatal accident occurred Yesko was in the company of five other sailors and five girls who were Virginia McCormick, 634 N. 11th, Shirley and Jeanette Lathen, Chehalis, Wash., and Dorothea and Virginia Alender, Holly hotel. Yesko's body is en route to the home of his parents in Erie, Penn.

## Walkout Hits Pacific Shipyard

SEATTLE, Aug. 23 (P)—More than 1500 steamfitters failed to report for work at the Todd Pacific shipyard, the Lake Washington shipyard and the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging company's shipyard today, in a jurisdictional dispute between the steamfitters and copper-smiths unions, both AFL.

R. J. Larson, president of Todd Pacific, where 1000 men refused to work, said the walkout eventually would curtail new construction and ship repair work.

Sgt. Donald R. Tucker, 21, was recently at home with his parents at Rt. 3, Box 917, on furlough after returning to this country from Italy. He reported to Fort Lewis on August 18 for further assignment. Since he has been in the service with the air corps, he has been awarded the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf cluster, the ETO ribbon and eight battle stars.

A brother, PFC Glenn Tucker, 28, has served with the army in Luzon, New Guinea, the Hawaiian islands, Guadalcanal and New Britain. He was discharged from the army on July 8 of this year on the point system. Another brother, Pvt. Raymond Tucker, 23, is in Germany with the army of occupation.

## Sgt. Lyon Visits In South Klamath

MALIN—Sgt. Robert I. Lyon, U. S. army field artillery, docked at Staten Island when the hospital ship, Santa Paula, brought home soldiers from Europe, is a guest of his brothers, Louis Lyon, Malin, and Carl Lyon, Merrill. He is a veteran of the Aleutian campaign, having served two years in the north. Later he was sent to Europe where he spent eight months in Germany.

He received a foot injury some weeks after the end of the war and spent three weeks in a hospital in France. Devastation along the Rhine is complete, he states, and the people of Germany have no choice but to move elsewhere and build again. Cologne and Coblenz are virtually annihilated.

Almost all of the citizens insist that they were forced by the nazi to take such part as they played in the war and none admit that they erred. Prior to entering the service 4 years and 6 months ago Sgt. Lyon was associated with West and Lyon, potato growers and buyers. He plans to return to Klamath county after being discharged. "There just isn't any place like it," he says.
