CHIEF WARNS MOTORISTS ON HOLIDAY TRIPS

Acting Chief of Police Orville Hamilton today cautioned motorists planning Labor Day trips to be on the alert for congested road conditions and to drive safely to avoid marring the first post-war Labor Day holiday with traffic fatalities. "Highways of this state will carry heavier volumes of traffic than in recent years," Hamilton stated. "We also expect the average traffic pace to be faster, due to the relaxation of the 35-mile wartime speed limit. Unless every driver is alert, these conditions may well result in serious accidents during the holiday period."

Hazards Listed
 Hamilton emphasized the fact that the average car today is about twice as old as was the case in pre-war years, and that tires, particularly, may not be capable of withstanding the frictions and pressure of sustained driving at high speeds. The accident hazard attendant to thoughtless driving is thus greater, he concluded.
