Wrong Conclusion

ACTUALLY the conclusion that we are coddling the Jap is about as far from the truth as it would be possible to get. Even if it were true that we are going a bit easy at the moment, let me ask this:

Tight Rein On Japs

AS matter of cold fact, the American supreme commander seems to have a very tight rein on the Jap government. He has been doing a grand job of long distance control, as the results testify.

The Job Ahead

SO when we land in Japan next week we shall go in with free hands. We shall make good lads out of the Japs—or break their necks in the attempt. But we shouldn't allow ourselves to entertain the mistaken idea that it's our business to take revenge.

No Lash For Nippon
