Safe courses can be charted through fog and night in congested, ship-filled harbors.

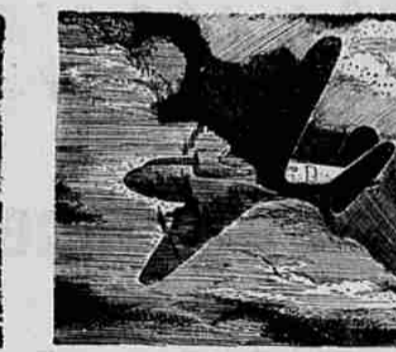
3 KILLED IN WRECK
