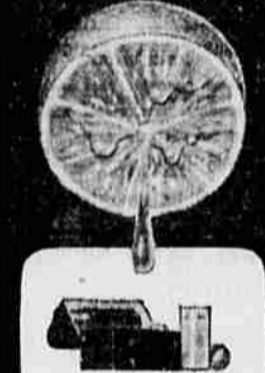

**Gunners From 73rd And 58th Return**

SEATTLE, Aug. 30 (AP)—A troop transport ship from the Pacific docked here late yesterday, bringing 1609 American servicemen and women home from the battlefronts. Included were more than 700 ill and wounded.

Air force gunners from the 73rd and 58th wings on Saipan and Tinian, all veterans of the early B-29 attacks on Japan and each with at least 35 aerial missions to his credit, were in the party. They were bound for nearby Fort Lewis for discharge or furlough.
