

HIGH SCHOOL CHANGES MADE THIS SUMMER

The doors of the high school will be thrown open September 4 and returning students will find a number of changes which have been made during the summer months. The biggest work program has been carried out in the cafeteria which has been redone in pastel colors. New and reconstructed tables have been topped with masonite finish in pastel colors of green, ivory and peach. Walls are in two tones of peach and curtains will be added to the windows. A new storage room has also been added for the cafeteria.

Storage Room
A two-story storage room was built during the summer to provide better storage facilities for janitor supplies, books, report forms and records. The central depository for books used in elementary schools throughout the city has previously been at Fremont but will now be in the high school.

Fluorescent lighting is being tested for school use in the retail selling class which is taught by Lucille Tweed. Cabinets have been built for the room for the purpose of displaying and cataloging material used in the class.

Mud Problem Out
The bus lot in the rear of the building has been black-topped which will eliminate the problem of mud. A retaining wall has also been built along the lot, and plans are to fill it in and plant shrubbery to correspond with the best wing of the high school grounds.

Babs Hutton Gets Another Divorce

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30 (AP)—Barbara Hutton, thrice-married dime store heiress, was granted a divorce today from Cary Grant in a brief hearing at which the British-born film actor did not appear.

"He did not like my friends," Miss Hutton testified. "When he came down and my friends were there he obviously didn't look amused. That upset me. It made me very nervous and that caused me to go under a doctor's care."

Her attorney, Jerry Giesler, told the court there was no property settlement and that waivers to that effect had been signed by both parties. Grant's attorney confirmed that statement.

\$10,000 Paid For Oregon Bull

SIXES, Ore., Aug. 30 (AP)—Sale of a Jersey bull for \$10,000—believed the highest-priced bull ever to leave Oregon—was announced today by Nash and Sweet, dairymen here.

The bull, Standard Dandy Sullivan, was sold to Glens Kingsley, Roseville, Ga. Animals from the same blood line have won grand championships at the national dairy show and sold as high as \$25,000.

JAP ATOMIC DEATHS SAID 'PROPAGANDA'

OAK RIDGE, Tenn., Aug. 30 (AP)—Japanese reports of deaths from radioactive effects of atomic bombing are pure propaganda, in the opinion of Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, commanding general of the Manhattan district.

Studies by scientists in this country do not bear out the death reports, Groves said at a press conference here today.

"Nothing could be more useful to the Japanese as propaganda," he asserted.

"While the people of the United States would be committing suicide if work on the atomic energy were not continued," Groves said, "I believe commercial use of this force are probably decades away."

"We want to have enough bombs for anything," he continued. "Hiroshima and Nagasaki should show that the nation having atomic bombs is in complete control of the situation."
