

PORK CUTS GO OFF PRIORITY SEPTEMBER 2

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Pork loins and shoulders will be removed from a government set-aside order September 2.

All cuts of beef, veal, pork hams, lamb and mutton had previously been removed from similar set-aside orders, which gave the government priority on purchases.

Lard Still on List

Lard remains the only pork product still subject to government requisitioning under set-aside orders.

The agricultural department said today's action was made possible because of reduced military requirements for the pork products.

Open Market

Future government purchases will be made in the open market in competition with civilian buyers.

Lard produced by federally inspected slaughterers—equivalent to four per cent of the live weight of hogs slaughtered—must still be set aside in 19 states. The states include: Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico and Wyoming.

Nazi Press Chief Interned By Yanks

HAMBURG, Aug. 31 (AP)—Otto Dietrich, former press chief of the Nazi government, was at an internment camp for interrogation today after convincing British officers of his identity.

Staff intelligence officers said he had attempted to give himself up several days before he finally was taken into custody. A British sentry at eighth corps headquarters in Plon castle told him: "Never heard of you—get going."
