Military Burial

First Real Meal
Conditions improved after Japan's surrender was announced, the prisoners said. Beatings were less frequent, and from plane-dropped rations the men got their first real meal in months.

Prisoners will be sent home as soon as possible. Air transportation will be provided if available.

WPB Chairman J. A. Krug said yesterday: "Reconversion is coming along better than we had expected."

Krug issued a report based on a WPB survey of 42 minor industries. He predicted that by December, industry will be producing civilian goods at a higher rate—in value—than it did in the pre-war years 1939-41. That doesn't mean industry will have absorbed all the unemployed war workers and veterans by that time. Far from it.

The "unemployment compensation" bill in congress is backed by President Truman. The proposal is to use federal funds to help the States bring their payments to jobless people up to a level of \$25 a week for 26 weeks.

But the powerful ways and means committee of the house apparently was frowning on the measure today. One supporter said privately that probably not more than six of the committee's 24 members would vote for the bill. Chairman Doughton (D-N. C.) said it puts "a premium on loafing."

ful Japs in a long time." Eichelberger declared in complimenting his long-time enemies for living up to the letter of the occupation agreement.

"If the Japanese continue their present attitude, there will be no trouble for them nor for us."

In contrast to the clear beautiful weather which marked yesterday's airborne landing at Atsugi and the occupation of Yokosuka naval base, up and across the bay from Tateyama, the leathernecks took possession of the vital naval installation in a driving rainstorm.

Surrender Plans.
Already, while plans for the final surrender ceremonies still were underway, naval occupation forces at Yokosuka had started development of the great base for the use of allied shipping.

The time for the Sunday ceremonies still was not announced and it was uncertain whether Admiral Halsey's flagship Missouri, aboard which the formal capitulation will be made, will remain at its present anchorage several miles off Yokosuka or will move in closer to give the population of the Tokyo-Yokohama area a close up look at the mighty 45,000-ton symbol of American sea power.

M'Arthur's Headquarters
General MacArthur, allied supreme commander for Japan, established his temporary headquarters in the New Grand hotel in Yokohama, Tokyo's port city. Much of the city was in ashes from the American fire-bombings of past months, but the New Grand stood out untouched amid the ruins.

The Japanese hustled about, ostensibly striving to smooth the way for the alien victors. One such Japanese touch was preparation of telephone directories, stencilled in English longhand and listing more than 1000 numbers for the various American installations.

The American embassy in Tokyo, its roof half burned off by an American bombing April 25, was scheduled for quick repair, to become MacArthur's regular headquarters.

No immediate march into Tokyo was planned, but in a constantly widening sphere stars and stripes supplanted the rising sun on the flagstaves of Japan.

Yank Precautions
For all the Japanese attitude of submission, the occupation forces were taking no chances on treachery.

Both yesterday, at the time of the formal mass landings at Yokosuka naval base in Tokyo bay and at the Atsugi airbase southwest of Tokyo, and again today, more than 100 Superfortresses and 60 Mustang fighters roared in steady circles over the landing scenes.

Nothing happened, but the Superforts and fighters were ready with 50-caliber machine guns to annihilate any show of opposition in the land they so recently devastated with fire, explosives and the heart-shaking atomic bomb.

ROTARIANS HEAR ALASKAN REPORT

"The war has put Alaska 50 years ahead," E. M. Carlson, a member of the Rotary club in Ketchikan and a resident of Alaska for 21 years, told Rotarians at the Friday luncheon.

Coastal and pan handle fishing is 80 per cent of the industry of Alaska, Carlson said, and minerals 15 per cent. Alaska contributes over half of the world's catch and maintains 159 canneries, and 60,000 fishing boats. Three million dollars worth of furs were exported last year from Alaska, and 13 per cent of the national forests are located there, he pointed out, forecasting a tremendous tourist trade in the near future.

Carlson was introduced as guest speaker by Percy Wells, program chairman.

Shaw stated today he had had a part in harvesting about 13 billion feet of pine timber, which in terms of payroll and supplies has brought millions of dollars into this community.

The Shaw plant at Tionesta, which was built in 1935, was destroyed by fire in October, 1944, and has not been rebuilt. It is understood Shaw plans to lease the townsite at Tionesta to the Finney company.

Coal, Firewood Ration To End

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31 (AP) Coal and firewood rationing in the Pacific northwest will end at midnight tonight, the district office of price administration announced today.

Rationing and priority restrictions were adopted in Washington, Oregon and 10 counties of northern Idaho in 1943 because of shortages of firewood, largely used for fuel.

The OPA said it was notified by headquarters at Washington that ample supplies of coal will be available for the northwest. Wood fuel, the OPA said, is still short—but abundant coal and oil eases the demand on wood.

Doctors To Use Fibrin Film To Save Twins' Lives

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 31 (AP) A mercy plane carrying a small quantity of fibrin film, rare chemical substance to be used in an effort to save the lives of the Miranda Siamese twins, arrived at Sky Harbor airport here shortly before noon today.

The plane was met by Rev. Emmett McLoughlin, superintendent at St. Monica's hospital where the five-day-old infants are being treated, who received the film. The film was donated to the hospital by the Harvard university department of physical chemistry. Instruction for the use of fibrin were included in the shipment, Father Emmett said, because the chemical has been used only twice in medical practice.
