Seattle Couple Take 55th Wedding Anniversary Trip East In The Model-T Car

The altitude of Klamath Falls didn't bother "Henry," the traveling model-T car, when it stopped here yesterday while en route to New Mexico. "Henry" or "Lizzie," as the car is sometimes called, is owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Hielscher of Seattle who are making their sixth trip to the east coast in the model-T. The car, bought in 1921 by the Hielschers, has had its wheels in the Atlantic ocean five times as part of the ceremony the Hielschers perform each time they have crossed the continent. "Henry" travels 22 miles on a gallon of gasoline but, according to Hielscher, if the wind is right it will make 23 miles on the gallon. The car, which has traveled 130,500 miles, averages 25 miles an hour and has been in every state in the union as well as Canada and Mexico.

Mr. and Mrs. Hielscher, both 78 years old, are making the trip to celebrate their 55th wedding anniversary. They are on their way to Hot Springs, New Mex. From there they will go to St. Paul, Minn., where they were married in June, 1891. They will visit the church in which they were married, accompanied by the same bridesmaid that they had then.

The Hielschers usually make the trip every three years although gasoline rationing prevented them from going until now.

Tourist accommodations do not worry them as they are quite used to sleeping in the car, Mrs. Hielscher said.

OPA REQUIRES NO MORE GAS RECORDS

Dealers, distributors and suppliers of gasoline and fuel oil are no longer required to keep records required by revoked orders 5C for gasoline and order 11 for fuel oil unless the records are required by some other regulation or order.

The army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, war shipping administration, maritime commission and other consumers will not issue any more ration checks for gasoline or fuel oil and are not required to surrender ration evidences for any transfers of gasoline or fuel oil made in the past. On and after August 15, 1945, gasoline and fuel oil are transferrable without surrender of any OPA ration evidences.

Licensed distributors of gasoline are no longer required to submit extra copies of their monthly reports and from form R-550-S to state fuel tax administrators for transmission to OPA. Fuel oil dealers and primary suppliers are no longer required to submit reports on OPA forms R-1119 or R-1119C.

Gasoline and fuel oil ration evidences in possession of industry including coupon sheets on deposit may be destroyed. OPA will instruct banks to close all consumer and industry account on gasoline and fuel oil. No further deposits of withdrawals are to be made.
