

Bus Schedule For Suburban Students Of KUHS Scheduled

For those students in the outlying districts who will attend Klamath Union high school this fall the following bus schedule will go into effect Tuesday, September 4.

The Shasta Way bus driver will be Homer Stiles who will be at Sixth and Madison at 8 a. m.; Shasta school, 8:02; Shasta Way at Madison, 8:03; Shasta Way at Ward, 8:05; Shasta Way at Gary, 8:07; Shasta Way at Derby, 8:09; Shasta Way at Summers Lane, 8:09; Shasta Way at Division at 8:15. The second morning trip will be at Shasta Way at Avalon at 8:20; Shasta Way at Arthur, 8:25; Shasta Way at Ward, 8:30; Ward at Cottage, 8:31 and at the high school at 8:45. There will be one trip in the afternoon with the same stops as above.

The bus driven by Roy Helmar will leave Algoma at the Horn service station at 8:05 a. m.; Shady Pine, 8:20; Wocus Flat, 8:30; Pelican, 8:40 and be at the high school at 8:50. The evening return trip will follow the same route.

Leaving the Largent ranch at 8 a. m. Driver H. B. Largent will be at the Furbers ranch at 8:05; Midland, 8:15; Weed Junction, 8:25; Carl Frei service station, 8:30; Riverside school, 8:35; Fremont school, 8:45 and the high school, 8:50.

Driver Elmer Smith will leave on his first trip at 7:40, travel South Sixth and Ward street, Hope street to Homedale avenue, up Homedale to South Sixth, to East Main, and up East Main to the high school, arriving at the high school at 8:15 a. m.

The second trip made by Elmer Smith will be out Oregon avenue to Biehn street at 8:30 a. m., out Oregon avenue to Nevada street, Front street to Hank street, Pelican school to Pelican highway, and back highway No. 99 to the high school. The first afternoon bus leaves at 4:05 p. m. and the second at 4:30.

Merle Hodge will be driver of the bus making the trip out East Main at 7:40 a. m. to South Sixth to Summers Lane at 7:55, south on Summers Lane, Anderson avenue, east to Altamont drive, north to South Sixth, arriving at the high school at 8:20. The second trip will leave the high school at 8:25, to Altamont and Boardman avenue at 8:30, Summers lane to South Sixth arriving at the high school at 8:50.

Driver Roy Jonas will leave the high school at 7:40, out to the north end of Wocus Flat, back through Wocus Flat to service station above Pelican on main highway, down through Baker's construction, by Signal oil, and through the underpass back to Pelican.

The afternoon bus traveling this route will be driven by

Burt Welch leaving at 3 p. m. to Pelican school, back through the underpass up to the highway, through Wocus Flat and back to the high school.

Driver Jesse Morris will leave South Sixth and Shasta Way to East Main, on to Fremont, from Fremont to Frei's service station, back to Fremont, on to Lakeshore drive, to Geary's seed shed, back Lakeshore to Conger school, on to Fremont and to the high school.

The first afternoon bus leaves at 3 p. m., goes to Riverside, to Frei's service station and unloads, back to Conger, out to Lakeshore Inn. The second afternoon bus leaves the high school at 4:05, to Fremont on to Conger, then out to Geary's seed shed, and back to Fremont.

Cafeterias in the schools will be opened Wednesday.

All Conger students up to the seventh grade are asked to report at Conger school for the first day of school. Some changes may be made later in the week.

KF LEADS CITIES IN SAFETY CONTEST

SALEM, Sept. 1 (AP)—Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Prineville and Bandon led in their respective population divisions in the cities traffic safety contest during the first half of this year, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., said today.

Wool Prices To Stay At Present Level

Prices received by farmers for wool will remain about at the present level through June, 1946, since the current support program applies to all wool offered to CCC and appraised prior to that date, the USDA points out. The average price to growers of 40.6 cents per pound for the first 6 months of 1945 was one-half cent lower than the corresponding months last year, largely due to differences in quality and shrinkage of wools. Two-fifths of CCC's 1943 and 1944 purchases were still unsold in June.

The AFL union, Lumber and Sawmill Workers, Yreka, Calif., has been elected as bargaining agent for employees of the Fruit Growers Supply company at Hilt, Calif., as the result of an election completed recently by the national labor relations board.

The AFL won bargaining rights for machine shop workers, logging truck drivers, and all woods employees of the company operations at Union creek and Beaver creek.

The vote was 44 for the AFL and nine voted no-union.

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL, of Hilt has held bargaining rights for the sawmill and box factory operations there since 1941. Both locals are affiliated with the Klamath basin district council, AFL, with headquarters in Klamath Falls.
