

Appeal Made For Increased Canning

The Oregon Federation of Women's clubs has received an appeal from the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration urging the increased canning of surplus fruits and vegetables over and above home domestic needs to provide urgently needed food for war relief not otherwise available.

Only food packed in tins under qualified supervision at community canning centers, school lunch rooms, home economics kitchens and custom canneries can be accepted.

Help can best be given by contributing or collecting surplus crops, assisting in canning, contributing tin cans, and helping in harvesting and transporting surplus crops, according to the appeal.

For information, those interested can inquire of teachers of home economics, local community canning supervisor, county agent, home demonstration agent, Farm Security advisor, local nutrition committee, Girl Scout or Camp Fire Girl leaders, Future Farmers or 4-H club leaders, or write to the Community Canning program for War Relief, 100 Maiden Lane, New York 7, New York.

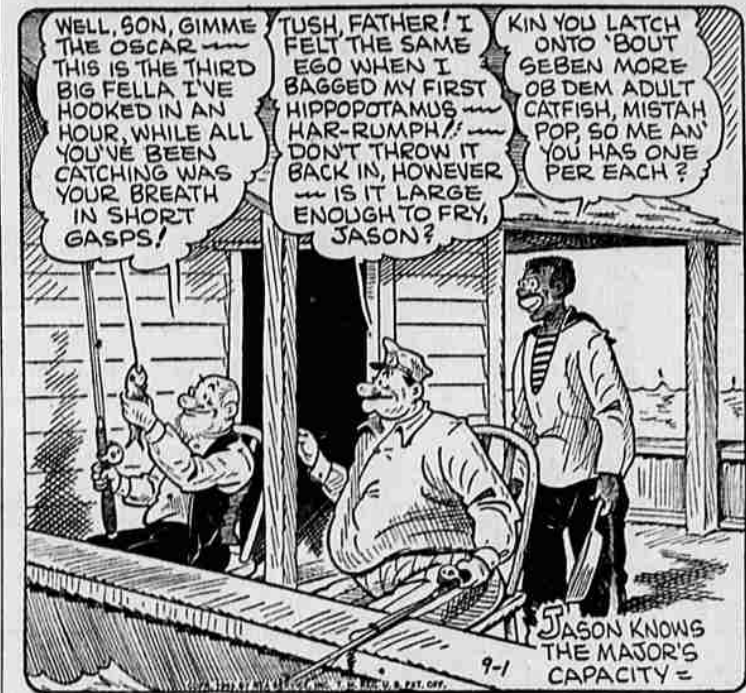
Fourth Birthday
