Returning Congress Faces 5 Major Peacetime Issues

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (P)—President Truman has drafted a comprehensive message for delivery to Congress this week, the White House said today, and later will submit his views on disposition of the atomic bomb in a separate communication.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters he would announce final plans tomorrow after a conference between the president and congressional leaders.

Five "Musts"
Facing the lawmakers returning from vacations out short by the war's end will be five administration-tagged "must" proposals dealing with:

1. Jobs for everyone willing and able to work. Congressional committees have been grappling with this one—the so-called "full employment bill"—for some time. They hope to work out a plan of cooperation between government, labor, industry and agriculture to create work for the millions idle or facing idleness because of shutdown of war industries. Just how long it will take to chart a plan, or how effective the plan will be, is uncertain.

2. Unemployment compensation. Senate and house committees are working on proposals to pay as much as \$25 weekly for 26 weeks to workers unable to find jobs. The administration is behind the plan, but Congress is cooling off on it. The issue may touch off President Truman's first big battle with Capitol Hill.

3. Surplus property disposal. A bill to substitute a single administrator for the three-man board now in charge of getting rid of war-born surpluses will be ready for house action next week. There may be a fight over how much authority the administrator should have.

4. Reorganization of executive agencies. Mr. Truman wants authority to abolish or merge many agencies. The house expenditures committee starts hearings today on the proposal. But committee sentiment favors limiting the president's reorganization power and exempting such agencies as the interstate commerce commission, the general accounting office and the federal communications commission.

5. Termination of wartime controls and laws. Many emergency acts are nearing expiration and congress must decide which to retain. Prospects are the second war powers act, from which rationing and priorities stem, will be kept on the statute books. Also it appears that the draft act will be permitted to run its natural course to next May 15.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (P)—Restriction on shipment of lambs into certain sections of Oregon have been lifted by the agriculture department.

A terminated order prohibited in-shippments of lambs, except to federally-inspected slaughterers, Hood River, Clackamas, Marion, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Jackson and the remainder of the state west of these counties.

The order was designed to aid in the marketing and distribution of "soft" lambs within the area. Such lambs, largely grass-fed, shrink heavily when shipped alive any great distance and are thus adapted only for local consumption.

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LOCAL POLICE REPORT HEAVY HOLIDAY TRAFFIC

4 Persons Believed
Drowned in San Juans

BELLINGHAM, Sept. 4 (P)—Four persons were believed drowned yesterday off Barnes island in the San Juans when the 16-foot outboard boat in which they were fishing swamped.

The body of Burges Columbus Kern, 53, Seattle, was recovered but three others, Beauford Erickson, Harry Nylen and son, Carl, of Bellingham, were not accounted for by coast guard crews and pleasure craft operators attempting a rescue.

Hundreds of yachts and other types of pleasure craft were forced to seek haven in island bays from a stiff wind that blew up quickly yesterday.
