

SALVAGE GROUP TO CEASE WORK SEPTEMBER 30

The Klamath county salvage committee will cease to function as such on September 30, according to a WFB directive received here.

Paul Lee, Klamath county salvage committee chairman, announced this week that any communities in the county with prepared tin cans on hand should contact him relative to moving it to shipping centers as soon as possible. All shipping centers are to collect and ship on or before September 20.

All accumulations of waste paper are also to be shipped, but since fats and oils will be in short supply for some time the program will be continued under the direction of Mrs. Winnifred Gillen. Housewives will continue to receive red points and cash.

During the time of the salvage collections Klamath Falls has jumped from 20th to 11th in the state in paper salvage, and up to fifth in state standing on tin collection.

Organizations helping in these drives have included the Boy Scouts, the Junior chamber of commerce, the Shriners and the city and county schools.

Rankin To Fight For Soldier Bonus

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (P)—Chairman Rankin (D-Miss.) of the house veterans committee said today he intends to press his fight for a soldiers' bonus.

Rankin's proposal, sidetracked only a few months ago by his own committee, calls for total readjustment payments of \$1040 for all honorably discharged veterans who have been in uniform 90 days or more.

Payments would be at the rate of \$20 a week for 52 weeks. The same pay is provided in the GI Bill of Rights, but only for veterans unable to find jobs.

Former Keno Sergeant Wins Oakleaf Cluster

KENO—T/Sgt. LeRoy V. Vermillion, formerly of Keno, has been awarded the Bronze Oak Leaf cluster. The citation reads in part:

"When his platoon leader was wounded and evacuated during a fierce enemy counterattack in the vicinity of Soaralutern, T/Sgt. Vermillion, weapons platoon sergeant, took charge of the platoon and directed fire upon the enemy. To place more effective mortar fire upon the enemy, he went forward and set up an observation post in a building overlooking the scene of action. He remained in this position despite enemy sniper and mortar fire, and directed the mortar fire which contributed largely to the rout of the enemy and caused their disorganized retreat. At times and in complete disregard of his own safety, Sgt. Vermillion directed fire from his own mortars so close to his own position that the shrapnel from the detonating shells hit the building where he was located."

RETURNS TO U. S.
WITH THE SECOND ENGINEER SPECIAL BRIGADE, SOUTHERN LUTON—After 28 months of overseas service in the Southwest Pacific, PFC Loren F. Borgerson, 25, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Borgerson, live at 520 S. 5th, Klamath Falls, is returning to the United States under the army's new re-deployment plan.

As a seaman and gunner in the amphibious 502d engineer boat and shore regiment, he participated in most of the major campaigns from New Guinea to Luzon. His outfit has 33 initial landings on enemy-held beaches to its credit.

In his more than two years' service in forward areas, Borgerson has had many exciting experiences. While hauling critically needed 155 mm ammunition up the narrow San Juanico strait, at the north end of Leyte island, to the frontline troops fighting the tough Ormoc campaign, a Jap plane suddenly appeared over a mountain, dove over Borgerson's boat and dropped bombs only a few feet away. The concussion lifted the boat several feet above the water's surface, but no one was hurt.

He wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with four stars, the Philippines Liberation ribbon with two stars, and the newly-authorized Bronze Arrowhead awarded for participation in one or more initial invasions.

How to can peaches with or without sugar

Some things you should know about capturing the delicious, ripe summer flavor of peaches for winter-time eating—

To Can
Peel, halve, pit; slice if wished.

Hot Pack: Cover with boiling syrup or water, boil 3 to 5 minutes. Fill hot jar to ½ inch from top with hot fruit and liquid. Remove bubbles. Wipe rim. Adjust lid. Process pints or quarts in boiling water bath.

Freestone—10 minutes
Clingstone—20 minutes

Cold Pack: Fill hot jar with peeled raw halves. Cover to ½ inch from top with boiling syrup or water. Finish as above, process in boiling water bath.

Freestone—20 minutes
Clingstone—35 minutes

Suitable Canning Syrup

Light Syrup: Dissolve 1 cup sugar in 3 to 4 cups water.

Corn Syrup and Honey: Corn syrup or honey may be used to replace up to ½ the sugar specified.

Water Pack: Peaches may be canned satisfactorily without sugar. Use boiling water or fruit juice in place of sugar syrup. The fruit will lose some flavor and color.

To Peel

Freestone and some Clings: Dip 6 to 8 at a time into kettle of boiling water for about 1 minute, then plunge into cold water and slip off skins.

To lye peel cling peaches: Use an enamel or granite kettle—not metal. Add 4 table-spoons lye to 2 gallons cold water. Heat to boiling. Place peaches in strainer, a few at a time, and lower into boiling solution; leave in 45 to 60 seconds. Rinse well in quantity of cold water—running water is best. Peel.

Warning: Follow directions carefully to prevent spattering of lye. Do not handle lye dipped fruit until it is thoroughly washed. Lye will burn if not properly handled.
