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3485 MISSING PWS FREED FROM JAPS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—The men who came back today gave America's war casualty wheel another spin in reverse. Ghostlike, they emerged from the far-away valleys of Japanese prisoner of war camps where some of them had been held since the dark days of Bataan and Corregidor.

Never Listed
By today's official count, 3485 missing army men who never had been listed as prisoners because nobody knew what happened to them, were removed from the missing rolls and restored to the liberated living.

An increase of 694 belated navy casualty reports offset this figure somewhat, however, and left the armed forces' combat casualty total for the war standing at 1,070,452. This was 93 less than last week's figure, and additional reports are yet to come.

Superfort Landing Set For Seattle

SPOKANE, Sept. 6 (AP)—The Superfortress which set a new distance record in a 5490-mile flight from Iwo Jima to Spokane was scheduled originally to land at Seattle, Spokane army airfield officials said yesterday.

Lt. Col. Joseph F. Brannock of Lexington, N. C., told army air force personnel here the plane continued on to Spokane when smoke and haze made a landing at Seattle impossible.
