

Leading Tigers Divide Double Bill With Yanks

Bruins Boost Lead To 4½ Games Over Cards By Lambasting Phillies Twice

Time is running out on the American league Tiger chasers with Detroit's 2½-game lead looming more formidable with each passing day as the opposition begins to get short on games to play.

Washington, the closest rival, has only 22 left and all of them must be shoved into the records before September 23 when the Nats wind up their schedule a full week ahead of the rest of the league.

Adding to the worries of the haggard pursuers is the newly-awakened home run power of the Detroit lineup which has accounted for seven four-ply swats in the last five tilts.

Browns Third

St. Louis' Browns, in third place but only four games back, match Detroit with 25 contests in the future book. Among the contenders only the New York Yankees with 26 and Cleveland with 28 have more left than the Tigers but their positions are deteriorating.

It was the old gopher ball that ruined the Yankees yesterday in the first game after they had rallied for three runs in the eighth inning at the Stadium. The largest weekday crowd of the season, 51,511 (44,705 paid), watched in awe as Eddie Mayo unloaded a three-run homer off Loyd Bevins, the Yank ace who had been called on to relieve Milkman Jim Turner. When Hank Greenberg followed with a long clout into the New York bullpen and Roy Cullenbine and Rudy York rang tremendous extra bases off the walls, the assembled multitude was ready to concede.

Yanks Find Weakness

After absorbing that disheartening 10-7 pasting in the opener after they thought they had it put away, the Yanks found the Bengali weakness in the second game. Lefty Joe Page, good enough to make the 1944 all-star team but later shuffled back to the minors, hurled his first complete game of the year, a gaudy three-hit effort that completely bamboozled the leaders, 5-1. Al Benton failed to last for the seventh straight time, a major mystery of the campaign.

St. Louis and Washington muffed a chance to gain when they split a pair at Griffith stadium, the Senators taking the opener, 2-1, in 11 innings on Mickey Vernon's five-hitter. Washington had the other half all wrapped up to take home when Lou Finney tied it up with a homer in the ninth and the Browns finally won out, 4-3, in the 10th on Vern Stephens' triple and Mark Christman's single.

Boston Whips Feller

Boston all but eliminated Cleveland from serious contention by beating Bobby Feller, 2-1, in the first of two, although the Tribe bounced back behind Allie Reynolds, 5-2, for an even break.

Chicago took both ends of a twilight double from Philadelphia, rounding out a complete twin bill program in the American, swamping the A's, 15-6, and skinning through, 6-5, in 14 innings.

Lefty Ray Prim and Claude Passeau boosted the Chicago Cubs' National league advantage to 4½ lengths by whipping the New York Giants, 5-2 and 10-2, in opening a long final stand against the invading eastern teams.

Cards Win

Harry (the Cat) Brecheen, St. Louis Cardinals' lefthander and top hurler in the National loop, earned his 11th victory to three setbacks, by dumping Boston, 4-2.

Brooklyn widened its third place margin over New York to three games by nailing out Pittsburgh, 5-3, on Goody Rosen's 10th homer with Vic Lombardi on base in the 10th frame.

Cincinnati gave Mike Modak his first big league decision, 1-0, at the Phillies' expense but the Reds couldn't stand prosperity and bowed, 8-4, to Charley Schanz in the afterdark half.

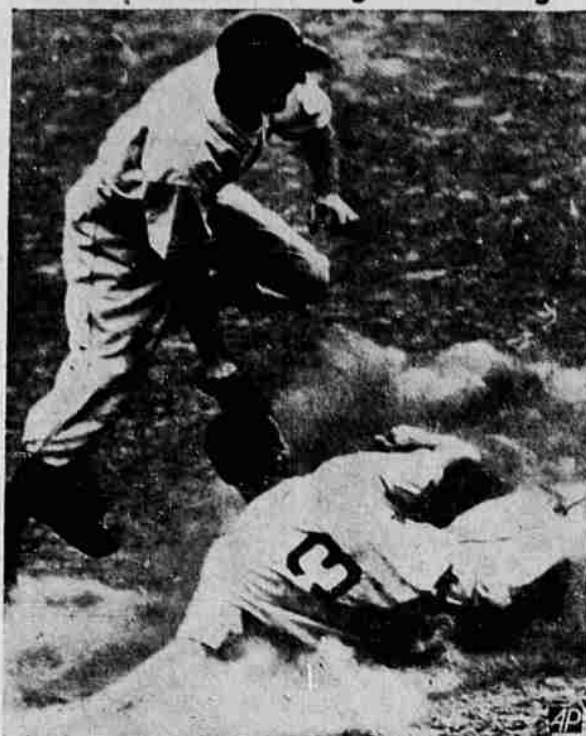
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Stan Hack Is Caught Stealing

Notre Dame Loses Captain Because Of Pro Contract

CHICAGO, Sept. 6 (AP)—The Western conference which sends three teams against Notre Dame this football season has one of its own stern directives to thank for seriously weakening the Irish on the eve of the 1945 campaign. Long a thorn in the Big Ten's side, the Irish must open their season against Illinois, a ranking conference favorite, without their captain and brilliant center, Frank Szymanski, who quit the squad yesterday because of professional commitments.

Only a few months ago, the Big Ten warned its members that under-graduates who enter agreements, verbally or otherwise, with professional teams would be barred from the intercollegiate competition. Notre Dame voluntarily abides by the Big Ten code, hence

Szymanski resigned his captaincy so he would not "embarrass" his school over the status of his eligibility which reportedly had been under secret fire.

Actually, a contract Szymanski signed with the Chicago Bears last January was voided by the National Football league because the player and his coach erred in reporting his class had been graduated in 1944. It was established he was a member of the '45 class, hence eligible for the league player draft last April.

Although the Detroit Lions claimed Szymanski, a Detroit boy, in the draft and the Irish center declined to sign in this instance, the spirit of his commitment to the Bears conflicted with the Big Ten ruling. Szymanski played on the 1943 Irish team and rejoined the squad later in the 1944 season, after his discharge from the navy.

Bevos Split With Angels; Increase Lead To 7 Games

First-place competition in the Pacific Coast league reached the anti-climax stage today as the Portland Beavers stretched their apparently insurmountable lead to seven games.

But lower in the first division a lively battle is continuing between the San Francisco Seals and Sacramento Solons—with the Oakland A's striving mightily to edge their way into the select playoff circle.

The Beavers wound up their stay at Los Angeles last night with a 1-4 and 6-4 doubleheader split that gave them a 4-1 edge in their abbreviated series. Roy Helser, who went to the relief of Don Pulford in the seventh inning of the nightcap, chalked up his 20th win of the season for Portland. He is the fourth hurler in the circuit to reach the 20-game mark.

The second-place Seattle Rainiers dropped almost completely out of the running in the pennant chase by losing twice to Oakland, 3-1 and 5-4, the second game lasting 11 innings. Joe Demoran bowed to Tom Hafey in the curtain raiser while Len Gilmore got credit for the finale. Ted Norbert, Seattle outfielder and the loop's leading home run

hitter, poled out his 21st round-tripper in the second game. The Oaks now lead 3-2 in the series which will be concluded tonight.

San Francisco tightened its hold on third by shelling the San Diego Padres 3-2 for the Seals' third victory in four starts this week. The Seals now lead Sacramento by a full game. Last night's engagement was a tight mound duel in which Elmer Orella bested Bob Ferguson. The Padres will end their home season this evening.

The Solons lost ground by dividing a twin bill with the Hollywood Stars 3-6 and 14-6, but still are four and a half games ahead of the fifth-spot Acons. Hollywood knocked 22-game winner Guy Fletcher out of the box with a four-run spurge in the sixth frame of the opener, but found the slants of Joe Wood, Jr., too tough in the afterpiece.

Games at San Diego and Oakland are the only ones scheduled tonight as the clubs prepare to switch locations for split-week series.

Coch Paul Angstead Seeks Quarterback As K-Men Go Into Pre-Season Workouts

Approximately 75 KUHS grid-ders worked out yesterday afternoon at Audoc field under the direction of Coach Paul Angstead and Assistant Coaches Ed Ryan and Clyde Roberts.

In an effort to find a man for the all-important quarterback slot Angstead is tentatively trying out Chuck Thurman, varsity end last year; Bob Dodson, fiery quarterback from last year's freshman team; Leroy Coleman, who played in the Wildcat backfield last season; and Irvin Whitt, a newcomer to the Pelican told who played left half-back on the Gresham junior eleven last season.

In the punting department, Ryan is looking over Ben DeVore, Tommy Edwards, and Bill Sari. Sari injured his head in tackling practice Monday evening and was not on hand last night.

Two other out-of-town prospects are Richard Foust, a line candidate from Tulelake, and Bob Thompson, a center on the Salem Vikings last season. The boys looked a bit beefier in their uniforms Wednesday and the Pelicans should field a team that will not give too much away in the weight department. Angstead and his assistants are working diligently with the Pelican squad and if hard work and perseverance count for anything at all the Red-and-White will be tough to get along with this fall.
