

BRITISH NAB 40 LEADERS IN NAZI INDUSTRY

HEREFORD, Germany, Sept. 6 (AP)—The British control commission, striking to carry out a sweeping denazification of Ruhr industries, today announced the arrest of 40 leading German industrialists, including Hugo Stinnes, one of the nation's greatest financial magnates.

All those arrested were members of the Rhine-Westphalian coal syndicate, which before the surrender controlled most of the Ruhr's coal as well as steel and other industries.

Today's announcement came on the heels of the arrest of Max Schmeling, former world heavyweight boxing champion, who is expected to be tried some time next week on a charge of "breach of military government orders."

Schmeling was arrested after dark yesterday, as were the industrialists. The arrests continued throughout the night and disclosure of additional arrests is expected.

British army officers hid the former champion from correspondents and photographers and said they would "absolutely forbid the taking of any pictures."

VICTORY PARADE TO OPEN CONVENTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6 (AP)—American Legion officers gathered today to open the Oregon state department's two-day convention here with a big victory parade scheduled for tonight.

Servicemen of nearby army, navy and marine stations and fraternal organizations will join the more than 500 Legionnaire delegates expected at the opening convention sessions at the civic auditorium tonight.

National Legion Commander Edward Scheibler and Gov. Earl Snell of Oregon will top the speaking program. Other national service leaders who arrived last night include Spence Eccles, national commander of the 40th E. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6 (AP)—The marine corps disclosed today that its top air ace—rough and ready Maj. Gregory (Pappy) Boyington, former leader of the famed "Black Sheep" squadron—may be a bit apprehensive of the hero's reception which is sure to greet his return home.

Boyington was scheduled to have returned shortly to America after being liberated from a Japanese prison, but the marine corps disclosed that he had decided to remain another week in the Pacific to regain his strength.

in the abdomen and threw him 15 feet.

Police caught up with them at an Oregon village named Waterloo.

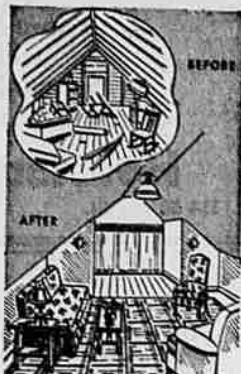
TRAFFIC HAZARD
