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LEADER URGES LABOR'S ENTRY INTO POLITICS

Labor should get into politics with both feet, but not into partisan politics, Virgil Burtz, international president of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, said in an address to the Kiwanis club yesterday.

Burtz said that the CIO political action committee does not represent an attempt to form a third party. He said it has worked in both parties, supporting candidates and policies favorable to labor.

"There's nothing the matter with that," said Burtz, "any more than there is anything the matter with farmers or business people supporting candidates and policies favorable to agriculture and business."

Burtz said that Sidney Hillman, CIO political chief, does not "take his orders from 'Uncle Joe Stalin' and is not a

guy with a long beard with mice running in and out of it." The speaker stated that the public should not form its opinion of labor because there are a few labor racketeers. Labor, he said, may have some racketeers, just as there are business racketeers, but labor organizations are mainly honest and sincere. Labor, he said, has "grown up" to accept its responsibilities and to conduct an active program in behalf of working people as a part of the American system.

Burtz was invited to speak to the Kiwanis club in connection with the observance of a Labor Day program. He did not mention the local CIO-IWA strike in his talk. He praised the contribution of labor as well as business and management to the war effort, and said that middle-of-the-road newspapers have given the public a true picture of labor's program.

Vernon Chase, local CIO official, was a guest with Burtz. George McIntyre introduced the speaker.

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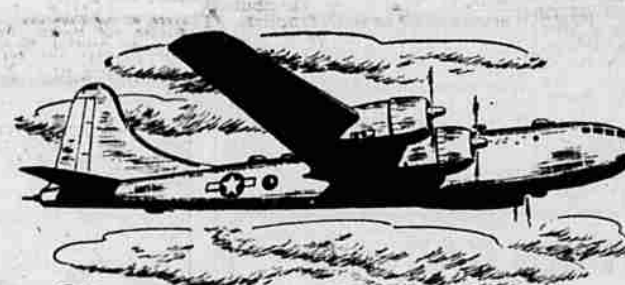
