Statements were issued today by three officials of Klamath Union high school regarding the donation by the Elks lodge of \$2500 toward the purchase of new uniforms for the high school band.

A. L. Gralapp, superintendent of schools, said:

"I have just learned that the Elks club of Klamath Falls has awarded the Klamath Union high school band \$2500 for the purchase of new uniforms. The fine morale which has been manifested by the membership of the band will be greatly strengthened by this outstanding gift. The high school band has become a community organization subject to frequent requests to participate in public programs. It will be a great day for the band and for our city when the new uniforms arrive. This gift is an outstanding event in Oregon high school history. Stanley Woodruff, principal of KUHS, said:

Building permits issued in August totaled \$68 for construction valued at \$70,860.50.

Two permits were for new business buildings at \$30,000, and 16 for remodeling business buildings at \$10,000.

Thirty-nine residence remodeling permits involving \$11,404.50, and two for private garages to be constructed at a cost of \$250; two for public garages at a total of \$12,750; one for a gas tank at \$50.

Two poster panel permits were approved, at \$150, and permits to remodel three schools at a cost of \$3500.
