GRANTS PASS—The Rogue River chapter of the Isaac Walton league and the Grants Pass and Josephine county chamber of commerce will co-sponsor a meeting in the interests of promoting tourist travel in Oregon. This meeting is to be held in Grants Pass in the high school auditorium on Thursday, September 13 at 8 p. m. The public is cordially invited to attend this meeting, and a large attendance is expected from throughout southern Oregon.
