

# English Bride Comes To Klamath Falls

It took ten months for T. Sgt. Donald Everitt to unwind enough red tape to bring his English bride, the former Gwendolyn Herbert, to the United States.

The couple met while Everitt was stationed in London, at the American Red Cross center where Miss Herbert was serving as a hostess. They became acquainted August 5, 1943, and were married by a U. S. army chaplain on July 15, 1944.

Everitt, son of Mrs. Earl Whitlock, Klamath Falls, was returned home and received his discharge from Fort Lewis, Wash., June 27, 1945. His bride arrived in Halifax, Nova Scotia, August 15, to find the country celebrating V. J. Day. She crossed on the SS Drottningholm of the Swedish line, a seven-day trip, and came across Canada by rail. Everitt met her in Portland August 22, and brought her to Klamath Falls, where they are making their home for the present with Mr. and Mrs. Earl Whitlock.

The wedding took place in an army chapel in London with an American Wac singing, accompanied on the organ by an American army major. T. Sgt. Stanley Hendricks of Klamath Falls acted as best man to the groom.

The bride wore a white satin gown trimmed with crepe-de-chine and silver sequins, and carried a sheaf of lilies. Her veil was fastened with lilies-of-the-valley and orange blossoms. She was attended by six bridesmaids.

The couple received three little horseshoes, according to English custom of wishing marital bliss.

Mrs. Everitt said the American accent didn't bother her as she has known many Americans. She said she had found the Klamath people very friendly, and the climate much better than in England. "American people wear much prettier, snappier clothes," Mrs. Everitt observed, "but the materials are not as serviceable and lasting as those made in England."

## Formal Dance

The first formal dance of the season sponsored by the USO was an event of Friday evening at the USO clubrooms. This is the first of a series of formal dances which are being planned for every month or six weeks.

Music was furnished by a six-piece marine orchestra. The ceiling of the main room and the hall was covered with the pastel colored crepe paper streamers.
