Members of the Klamath county home economics committee will gather Wednesday morning at the home of Mrs. Rex High, chairman of the group, at 10:30 a. m., for a potluck luncheon and the annual business meeting and get-together for active members of the committee and those who have served in former years since the beginning of home extension service work in Klamath county in 1938.

The history of home economics work in connection with the Oregon State college extension service actually got a start in 1922, when Mary McComb, now county librarian, carried on the work for a short time. In 1938 Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen was appointed to be home demonstration agent for the county, and at that time the county home economics committee was organized with a rotating membership chosen from each of the various communities of the county.

CHARLES E. CAREY DIES AT SAWTELLE

Charles E. Carey, 55, regional director of the United States bureau of reclamation, died Sunday, September 2, in the veterans' hospital, Sawtelle, Calif. He had been ill several months.

Mr. Carey's headquarters were in Sacramento. His appointment as regional director in 1943 of administering the federal land, water and power development policies established by congress and assigned by it to the jurisdiction of the bureau of reclamation.

Mr. Carey is survived by his widow, Verle Carey, and his daughter, Marjorie, a student at College of the Pacific, Stockton.

FREEMONT, Ill., Sept. 10 (AP)—As a boy, Fireman Alvin Lawver always liked to nose around in his mother's kitchen.

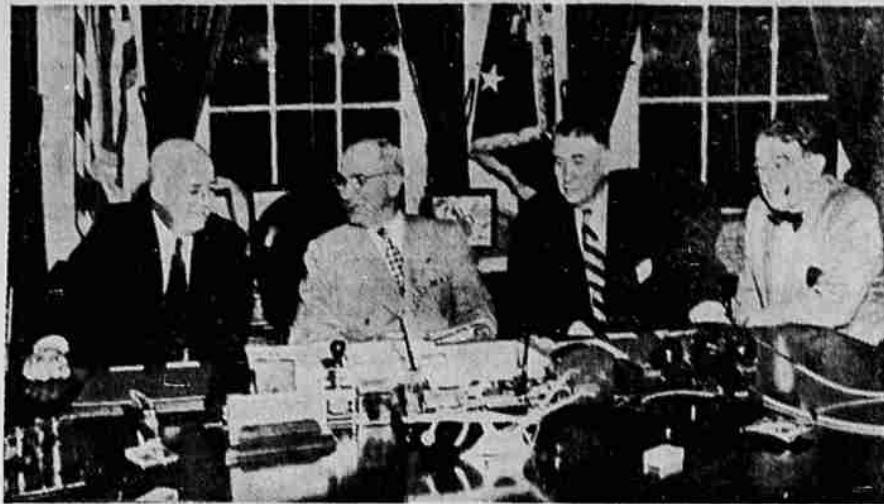
So now he bakes 25 to 40 dozen cookies weekly for the servicemen's snack bar—and has 10 favorite recipes.
