

100 YANK PWS DIED IN WINTER AT JAP CAMP

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 3 (Delayed AP)—One hundred American prisoners of war of a total of 400 died in a single winter from malnutrition and exposure in one Japanese prison camp, Capt. Howard W. Friedman of San Francisco, U. S. army medical officer, said today.

The camp was near Yokohama, where the prisoners worked in heavy industries. Friedman said he kept records and aided in the treatment of the sick but that medical supplies were almost non-existent.

"We have been dead—all of us—for over three years," he added, "but now we live again and it's good to be alive."

Friedman and 194 Americans were first located when fifth air force planes landed on the outskirts of fire-razed Tayama.

Suffering Stories

They related stories of suffering to Sgt. Al Martin of Topeka, Kans., who was on one plane. All were captured early in the war in the Philippines and were from the fourth marines, 31st infantry and other units. They were brought to Japan, crowded like cattle, in the hold of a captured ship, the "Canadian Inventor."

They had been held in the Tayama camp since June. All were able to walk but all were very weak from malnutrition.

Lt. Col. Guy Stubbs of Peach Bottom, Pa., senior officer, said: "Not once did these men lose hope or faith even when the going was the most rugged. They are real soldiers—every man of them."

Col. Gerald R. Johnson of Eugene, Ore., the fifth air force's leading ace, piloted the first rescue plane to reach the camp.

KF Woman Fractures Jaw In Accident

Three heavy cruisers and two escort carriers will be among the flotilla at Portland. Four ships will tie up at Vancouver, Wash.
