

# Pelican Bay Boxes For Overseas Use Again Distributed

Wooden boxes for overseas mailing to servicemen will be in the usual distribution places this week. Dates for overseas mailing are September 15 to October 15, the same as last year.

This is the fourth year these sturdy boxes have been distributed by the Pelican Bay Lumber company, and they hope this will be the last year they will be necessary. In spite of strike conditions, the company is getting them out as fast as possible to be ready for the mail deadline.

The boxes are regulation mailing size, 4 1/2 by 6 1/2 by 1 3/4, they are made of ponderosa pine, the lids fastened by one nail so they may be swung aside for postal inspections, and they are supplied by a length of stout twine to be tied around them.

In 1942, 12,640 boxes from Pelican Bay went overseas, in 1943 there were 18,390, and last year 28,003 were mailed. Already this year 8500 have been mailed and 5000 are nearly made up now for distribution this week.

The boxes have no advertising on them, not even the name of the lumber company, and there is no price on them. H. D. Mortenson asked one of his men to make up a strong box for overseas mailing to a relative in the service four years ago. When he saw the box prepared for his use he was pleased with the stout, clean efficiency of it and thought why shouldn't every boy in the service receive his gifts from home so well packed.

Letters from all over the globe, show what the boys think of the idea. Besides enthusiastic comments on the condition of gifts packed in the boxes, in every case, the boys listed some of the uses of the boxes afterward. Often they were used for sending things home and some boxes made as many as six and eight trips back and forth.

Three served in a frontline hospital in Africa as card index files for patients' records. In Alaska the boxes were used to protect valuable instruments against the weather. Someone tacked up one of the boxes at a station in Iceland, stood a telephone in it and wrote on the lid, "Pay Station, USA 5c."

From Australia, Saipan, England, Sicily, Burma and France, letters have told of the pleasure of receiving articles packed in the Pelican Bay boxes. One boy wrote that after the men divide up the edible contents in a package from home (they let the recipient keep inedible articles) they draw lots for the box.

Among places where the boxes may be had are Klamath county chamber of commerce, First National bank, Willard and Winema hotels, and in Malin, Merrill and Beatty.

# CIO UNIONISTS SIT WITH PIRC ON WAGE ISSUE

The strike situation in the major part of the Klamath lumber industry remained virtually the same today and there was no indication of any attempt to reach an agreement by either Weyerhaeuser company officials or CIO unionists.

A ray of hope that was given Klamath's strike-weary public was dimmed as no word was forthcoming from officials of the U. S. conciliation service who are in session in Seattle.

It had been rumored that some settlement might be effected by the conciliation service. CIO union officials met with heads of the Pine Industrial Relations committee this morning to discuss a wage increase demand of 27 1/2 cents an hour that was petitioned for by the union in 1944, according to Virgil Burtz, vice president of the CIO.

This meeting has no effect on the present derelict and by the union for a union which has shut down four major Klamath mills.

AFL machinists employed at the Weyerhaeuser mill, who had indicated that they would go through the CIO picket line if a settlement was not reached, made no attempt to pass through the line this morning which was bolstered with approximately 35 CIO unionists.

The union has distributed a handbill saying, "Put it up to a vote of the companies' employees, whether they belong to the union or not, if they want to return to work with a union shop clause in their contracts."

This vote has been suggested by the union as a means of settling the strike.

# CONSPIRACY CHARGES

sult in the more serious charge. The maximum sentence for felonious jailbreak is three years in the state prison.

# MANY REGISTER AT FARM LABOR OFFICE HERE

At the farm labor office plenty of men are registered for work. Very little potato digging is being done at present although several growers expect to start this week. Most of the other farm work being done now is taken care of, with plenty of help.

The situation at the United States employment office is a little different. Employers are clamoring for help in almost every line of work. Fifty carpenters are needed immediately, radio repairmen are in demand, office workers and common laborers are needed.

In spite of the lumber strike, men are hesitant about taking jobs out of their line and most of the activity at the employment office is at the unemployment compensation desk.

**Veterans Register**  
Les Finley, in charge of veterans' employment in the USES office, has numerous veterans registered for work, but many of them are unable to do heavy labor and are unskilled in many of the positions listed at the office.

The labor situation summed up would seem to be that those qualified for certain types of work are engaged in that line, others are waiting for a definite type of employment, such as farm workers standing by for harvest work, others available are either not qualified or not able to undertake the work for which they have been trained, and there is still a tremendous demand which is not being filled, for help in nearly every field.

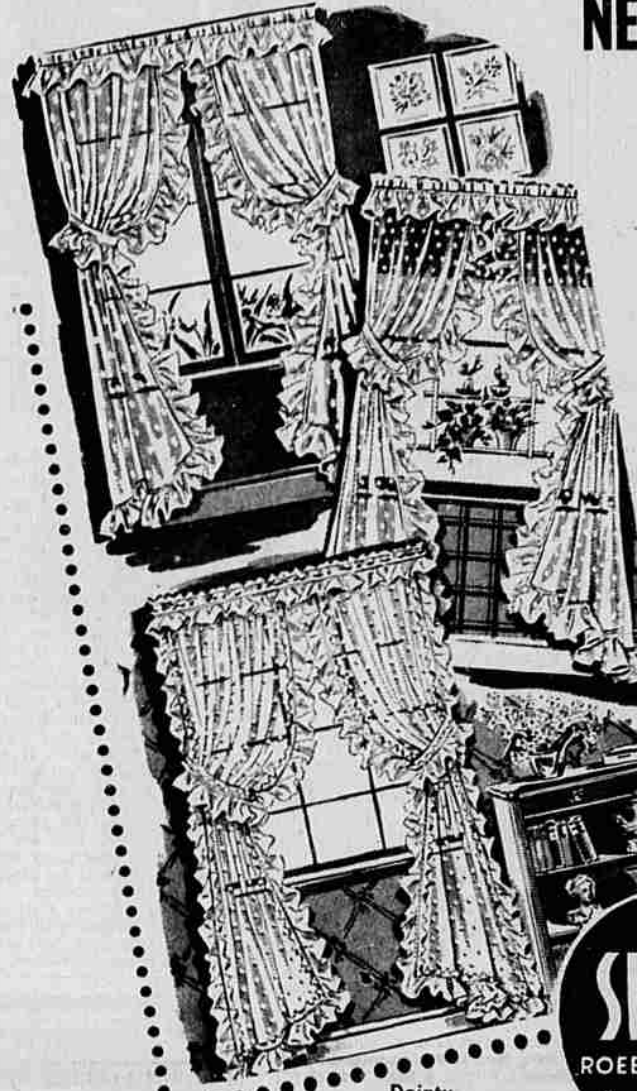
