STATE POLICE WIDEN PATROLS IN COUNTY

The Oregon state police post here has lengthened its patrols since the termination of the Japanese war and now covers all of Klamath county. Sgt. Earl Tichenor, officer in charge, said this morning.

The boundaries of the police patrol now extend north and south to highway 97, east and west to highway 86, and south to highway 39, Tichenor declared.

Minor cases now appear in justice courts in Chiloquin, Crescent, Merrill, Bly, Sprague River, and Bonanza, as well as Klamath Falls, he said. During the war, state police were more or less restricted on tires and equipment, but the local post is now back on a pre-war basis, Tichenor stated.
