

Planting Of Willow, Poplar Trees In City Banned By Council

Several ordinances were passed for their third and final readings at the city council meeting on Monday night. These included an ordinance regulating the removal of roots of trees and shrubbery clogging water and sewerage lines and prohibiting the planting inside the city limits of any poplar or willow trees. It also provides for enforcing clearance between sidewalks and trees.

Another ordinance passed Monday night makes it unlawful to store gasoline in underground tanks without permits. An ordinance which provides that property owners being placed in a more restricted district must first be notified was also passed. An ordinance making it unlawful to cut corners in order

to avoid stop signs was also passed at this meeting. This was brought about because of the many people cutting across service station corners to keep from stopping at lights or stop signs.

Building Inspector
The name of Gus Johnson was submitted to the council to be considered for the position of city building inspector. It was decided that Johnson would take this position on a temporary basis for one week and the appointment will be acted upon at the next meeting.

New Airport Group
The old municipal airport committee was dissolved last night and a new one was appointed by Mayor Ed Ostendorf. G. A. Krause, Cliff Dunn and Phil Hitchcock were appointed members of the new airport commission.

Some discussion was carried on in the matter of property being given or sold to the city for the Klamath Memorial park. City Attorney Henry Perkins was authorized to draw up papers for the part purchase of property owned by Mrs. Alice Z. Goeller. Part of the property is being given to the city.

Action was held up on property owned by E. A. Dunham who offered to sell it to the city minus 10 per cent which he will make as a gift for the Memorial park.

Sidewalk Petition
A petition was read which was signed by 93 people requesting that a sidewalk be put on the west side of Worden from the 1600, to the 1800 block as the post office will not deliver mail to this area unless a suitable sidewalk is put in. Mayor Ostendorf told two representatives of this district who appeared at the meeting that the city had no money in its budget for this and it will have to be taken up with the bond committee and reported on at the next meeting. Councilman Rollin Cantrall emphasized the fact that some policy should be worked out on this as most of the lots affected belong to the city.

Final Hearing
The final hearing set for the purpose of airing any objections to the vacation of an alley between 9th and 10th streets on what may be considered a continuation of Washington street was held and there were no objections. An ordinance was therefore introduced which will be passed after the third reading which will make it possible for this alley to be closed.

Councilman Cantrall asked a section of 10th street be sprinkled because trucks and cars are stirring up quite a bit of dust. Insurance on the airport hangar was also discussed and it was brought out that the city would save money if insurance premiums were paid on a three-year basis rather than a one-year basis. The matter will be studied.

Licensing Fees
It was also suggested that any changes or amendments in licensing fees be made before the first of the year to save work for the city clerk's office in case fees might be changed later in the spring.

Councilman Harvey Martin brought up the matter of the houses situated in the middle of Plum street and it was suggested that perhaps at some future date these houses might be moved.

HOME STUDY OFFICERS TO MEET FRIDAY

Next week will mark the beginning of Klamath county home extension activities after the summer's interim, according to Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, county home demonstration agent, in announcing the organization of the long-awaited Klamath Falls extension study unit.

The first meeting was held on Tuesday afternoon and the home extension program for the year was outlined by Mrs. Harry Mitchell of Malin, former state home extension leader.

Officers of the Klamath county home extension study groups will gather in the parlors of the First Methodist church in Klamath Falls on Friday, September 14, for a training meeting under the direction of Frances Clinton of Oregon State college.

Three officers from each of the 18 units in Klamath county will be here for the meeting, scheduled for 10 a. m. A luncheon will be served at the church at noon and those who attend are asked to bring sandwiches, cookies and table service for themselves. Salad and a beverage will be served by members of the county home economics committee.

With redeployment of troops and material, F/O Arnold will play a big part in increased activities of the North African division of the air transport command.
