Opportunity for an education is an American principle provided each boy and girl. Your education is the one thing which no man or law can take from you.

TRADE GROUP VIEWS SERVICE TO ALASKA

Highways and airways to Alaska were points of interested discussion at a meeting in Portland Monday.

Charles R. Stark, manager of the Klamath chamber of commerce, attended the session of the Pacific Northwest Trade association in Portland, with representatives from all over Oregon, Washington and British Columbia.

The highway to Alaska through British Columbia, and establishment of air service to Alaska connecting with Portland, Seattle and Canadian points, came under thorough discussion by the group.

Establishment of foreign trade zones and tourist promotions for this area were discussed. The general conclusion on this was that with no facilities at present to accommodate tourist trade, promotion plans must wait until improvement plans have been formulated and carried out.

Chamber managers got together and exchanged solutions on similar problems in their territories.

Trucks Replace Jeeps On Ford Assembly

First of 1900 trucks scheduled to roll out of the Richmond, Calif., Ford plant for Pacific coast distribution during September came off the same assembly line on September 5 that was traveled by more than 49,000 jeeps during the war years.

Outstanding improvements have been made in the new trucks over 1942 models, according to A. S. Hatch, regional manager of western area branches of the Ford Motor company. These improvements include motor changes, adjustable seat backs for more driving comfort and windows safeguarded with steel frames. Chassis include the 114, 134 and 158-inch wheel-base models.

Approximately 1800 employees are at work in the plant whose peak wartime employment was 2200. Many women are still at work. These trucks were the first to be turned out of the Richmond plant since the company shifted to war production on March 24, 1942.

BUILDING JOBS GET APPROVAL OF COUNCIL

Building permits approved by city council Monday night included permits for several large construction jobs in Klamath Falls. The largest is the garage building, 606 S. 6th, at \$18,000, the permit for which was issued to J. B. Elie.

Permits were also approved for remodeling The Herald and News building at a preliminary figure of \$5000, and constructing a steel radio tower on the Balsiger building, \$9000, to Herald Publishing company.

Other permits were to build a garage, 733 Upham, \$300, Frank Cotten; one room addition to residence, 1963 Auburn, \$250, H. S. Wood; addition to garage, 1204 California, \$300, Lloyd W. Rusk.

General repairs, 1845 California, \$200, W. J. Easter; erect panel, Rt. 1, lot 1, Easterly 20 feet of lot 2, block 23 original town, \$50 and erect panel S. 6th, south of viaduct, \$50, Frank Meads.

Porch on house, 2114 Tunnel, \$100, Ira H. Magee; remodel living room, 1536 Oregon, \$150, Mrs. M. C. Adkisson; construct new warehouse, Market street, \$14,000 and remodel garage 7th and Klamath, \$2000, E. B. Brostherous.

Navy Pays To Save, Department Reveals

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The navy will continue paying cash to civilian employees who come through with ideas to save money, labor or time.

In one year, Undersecretary Artemus L. Gates said today, 17,000 suggestions were adopted and some \$86,000,000 saved.

"We will continue to encourage the submission of constructive ideas," Gates said in a statement, "so that the navy may operate at the highest possible efficiency on a peacetime budget."

UNTRoubLED

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12 (AP)—Col. Franklin T. Matthias, supervising engineer at the Hanford, Wash., atomic bomb plant, told businessmen here that Japanese charge that the atomic bomb was "inhuman" did not trouble his conscience. "I feel that saving the lives of our fighting men was worth any cost," Col. Matthias declared, and that "early end of the war also saved lives of millions of Japanese."

ACQUITTED

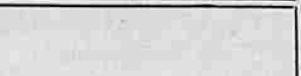

3 Servicemen Scale Mt. Shasta In Bitter Weather

Braving thin air, biting cold and a 70-mile an hour gale, two marines and a sailor climbed to the top of Mt. Shasta, 14,162 feet above sea level, during a Labor Day excursion to the north California mountain country.

The marines, Pvt. Alvin Carpenter and PFC Clement Lesueur, with ARM Tei M. M. Miller, a member of torpedo squadron 5 at the air station, reached the top in four hours and 25 minutes. They started from a lodge at timberline at 8:05 a. m.

40 Start Climb

Twenty-nine marines and 11 Waves and sailors started the climb. The summit of Mt. Shasta is about four miles distant from the lodge a 6181-foot ascent at an average 33-degree grade.

The Waves dropped out at the 12,000-foot mark and the remainder of the party went on another thousand feet. Only Carpenter, Lesueur and Miller went all the way to the top.

Because of the gale—a plane flying overhead registered the 70-mile wind—the three men were forced to crawl full-length much of the remaining distance. "It seemed as though if we'd let even an inch of space come between our bodies and the ground we'd be blown off the face of the mountain," Carpenter said.

Five Below

Wearing only dungarees and combat jackets, they weren't too well prepared for the five-below-zero cold encountered. After reaching the top they paused only to catch their breath, then headed back to the lodge. The return trip took about three hours.

Each man carried with him half a canteen of water and five candy bars. Carpenter related that each time they'd unscrew the lid off a canteen it would "pop like a champagne cork" because of the constantly changing atmospheric pressure.

Woodsmen's Axe Destroys Klamath Falls Landmarks

Five large poplar trees which have stood at the Klamath county courthouse grounds on Main, long before the courthouse was built, are being cut down this week.

William F. Gray, county janitor, is supervising the job with a crew of workmen obtained through the U. S. employment bureau.

The beautiful old shade trees have served their time. They are rotting with age and may blow down any day. They are too old to be topped successfully, and their roots go way below the pavement and cause grief in the sewerage system. They are taking nourishment from the lawn and the young trees, so they must come down.

Chinese elms were planted to shade the courthouse grounds four years ago. They were all planted the same day and are all about the same size. Soon they will be big and beautiful and the poplars will not be missed. These trees have another type of roots and will never have to be removed for causing trouble in the drains.

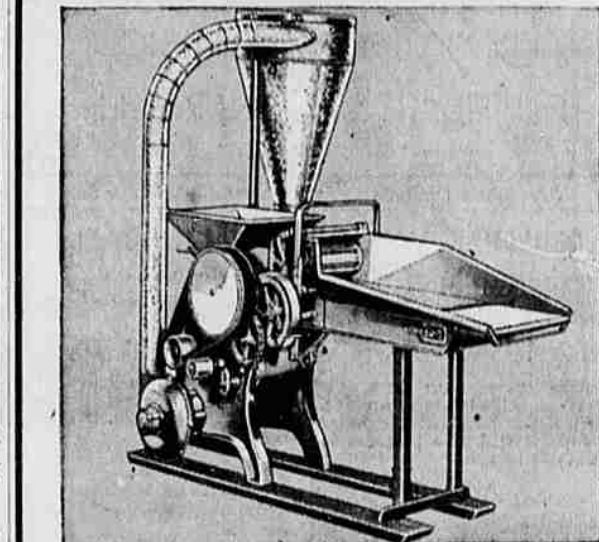

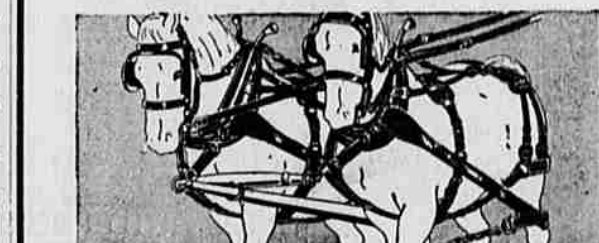

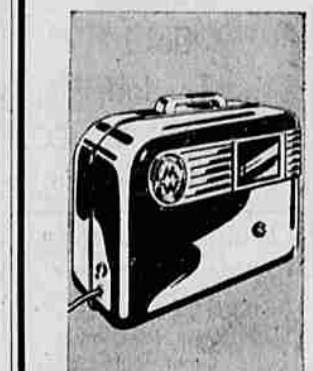
