The machinists gathered on the hill near the Fairhaven school, and came down in close order.  
After they had passed through, there was some complaint from CIO men to Sheriff Low about the "law not protecting us." The sheriff said afterwards that he was not interested in either side in the strike, but was doing his required duty in keeping the public road open.  
First indication the machinists intended to return to work came more than a week ago, when machinist officials said they had investigated the CIO strike and found it "illegal." They said they were no longer obligated to respect the picket line. CIO officials said today they had no statement to make at this time on the day's developments.

**Police Court**—Four drunks appeared in police court this morning and five additional drunks and three disorderly conduct cases bailed out. Twelve parking tickets were paid.

wanted, than that they should pick up what struck their fancy?  
This fact became apparent early: Every German house, especially every BIG German house, of the type that might naturally be expected to house a Nazi big shot, would be STUFFED with goods far beyond the requirements of a normal household. In these stores, there would be an obvious preponderance of beautiful old china and silver and furs and paintings. It seemed pretty plain that the owner of the house had been in some way or other a receiver of stolen property, and so there was the feeling that in picking up a few objects that would later look mighty nice on your table or on a shelf back home you weren't really stealing but were only recovering property from a thief.  
Anyway these krauts who had been shooting at you only a few hours before were gone and what was left of their stuff was strewn all around and if you didn't pick up a souvenir here and there it would be too late and besides the owners would never see it again.

**THE** mystery is that so LITTLE was taken.  
The reason so little was taken is that these boys of ours that had made up this hard-fighting, hard-hitting army that was too much for the best German hereditary war-makers could send against them are basically decent, well-brought-up youngsters coming from American homes where they had been given the right kind of training.  
In all the centuries that this cockpit of Europe has been fought over, there was never such an invading army before. That is something for us to be extremely proud of.

SO much for our own looting—which, after all, amounted to not much more than souvenir hunting. The Russians looted, and still are looting, in a different way.  
One must be careful about using the word "loot" in connection with what the Russians are doing. They lived off the country when they came in, and are still doing so. They are stripping Germany clean of EVERYTHING that may be of use in restoring Russia, and are shipping it home.  
It is doubtful if there has been much individual Russian taking. Indeed, there is plenty of evidence that individual Russian looters are severely and promptly punished. What the Russians take, they seem to take for the state.  
But there is general agreement that they aren't leaving much.

is now being liquidated by Neil Dalton of Louisville.  
2. Said it was "perfectly silly" to suggest—as some republican congressmen have—that an American loan to Great Britain would be used to underwrite the labor government's "socialization" of Britain.  
3. Promised that Japanese officials will be ousted from their posts in Korea as soon as possible. (They were temporarily retained in office, he explained, because of practical considerations.)  
4. Announced the appointment of three associate justices of the U. S. court of appeals for the District of Columbia. They are: Former Senator Bennett Champ Clark of Missouri, E. Barrett Prettyman of Washington, and Wilbur K. Miller of Owensboro, Ky.  
Only authorized quotation of the news conference was the one about the loan to Britain. It went like this:  
"I think that's a perfectly silly conclusion. (That the money would be used for socialization.) Great Britain is entitled to the type of government that Great Britain wants."  
The president displayed a newly-acquired gold pass admitting him and his "party" to the world series games. He conceded with a laugh that "party" might be construed to mean all democrats. Might even take in White House reporters, he said.

A congressional investigation of the Pearl Harbor attack was all set. Both the senate and House voted for it, unanimously. That means more quizzing for army-navy big shots. Six democrats and four republicans will do the quizzing.  
Un-American activities snapped back into the news when the house committee to investigate them held its first formal meeting under the new chairman, Rep. John S. Wood of Georgia.  
This used to be the "Dies committee." Wood said he expects the group to have more work than ever before. (But he said he's going to be mighty careful whom he labels "un-American.")  
Herbert H. Lehman, boss of UNRRA—the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration—came before the senate foreign relations committee for stiff questioning.  
Meantime a republican from Pennsylvania, Rep. James Fulton, just back from Europe, took a poke at UNRRA. He said its activities are a "laughing stock" in Europe.  
And there was tax news: Those tax cuts that corporations and individuals are expecting January 1 became even more likely—in fact, pretty certain—when the house committee on ways and means voted unanimously to get going soon on a quick tax bill.  
There will be a tussle over the amount and method of the cuts. But if the tussle doesn't last too long, some sort of cuts can be expected.  
As for the situation on unemployment: The Truman-sponsored plan for bigger benefits to the unemployed was given a surgical operation by the senate finance committee.  
Here's what was removed: federal cash to increase weekly payments made by state governments.

"The aircraft suddenly dived, crashed and exploded. There were no other survivors. Names of the dead will be released after next of kin have been notified.

# Point Score Cut By Marine Corps

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The marine corps today reduced its critical point score for release of all marines 35 years of age and older.  
The changes, announced by Gen. A. Vandegrift, marine corps commandant, are effective immediately. They are the first reduction in the marines' critical score, originally announced August 15.  
In connection with the release of personnel over 35, it was pointed out that the marine corps point system, unlike that for the rest of the navy, allows no credit for age.

by after the transfusion of whole blood and injections of penicillin.  
Doctors, who had said he had a better-than-even chance to live, declared his condition now was "very satisfactory." Tojo himself was strong enough to thank them and to tell a Japanese government representative, T. Suguki, who visited him at the Yokohama, that he appreciated the care he was getting.  
**Best of Care**  
The blood donation came from Sgt. John A. Archinal, a veteran of New Guinea and the Philippines, who said, "I'm doing this so he can get his just dues and suffer for the 17 months he made me spend in New Guinea."  
General MacArthur's personal physician, Col. Roger Egeberg, South Euclid, Ohio, rushed to Tojo's bedside to join in the fight for his life. Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, commander of eighth army occupation forces, said that the best possible nursing care had been ordered, adding, "We want the Japanese government to know that."  
Eichelberger said Tojo shot himself with a U. S. army air corps pilot's pistol. The number of the Colt automatic 533330, was too high for pre-war issue, the general said. He reported that Tojo asked where he obtained the gun, had replied "from the Japanese war department."  
**Aviator's Pistol**  
"I believe the pistol was shot down during the war," Eichelberger concluded. He has the pistol, together with the hara kiri knife and unsheathed ceremonial sword found near Tojo.  
Four nurses arrived from the 42nd General Hospital, University of Maryland unit: Lt. Elizabeth Gunby, Salisbury, Md., Lt. Birdie Gorsuch, Baltimore, Lt. Elizabeth Nunneless, Washington D. C., and Lt. Rebecca Schmidt, Long Green, Md., who remarked, "I didn't think we would come to this, after 40 months overseas."  
Tojo said he fired his hairy pistol shot yesterday as American war-crimes investigators pounded at his door because he "did not want to stand before the victor to be tried." Yet trial seemed certainly in store for him and many of his henchmen, including the Pearl Harbor captain.

**Puppet Held**  
First to be detained of the 39 others that General MacArthur had ordered held were Jorge Vargas, puppet Philippines ambassador to Japan; Mark Lewis Streeter, American captured at Wake island by the Japanese and charged with later making propaganda broadcasts for them from a prison camp; Heinrich Stahmer German ambassador to Japan; and Col. Josef Alfred Meisinger, police attache at the German embassy.

# Fire Destroys Rogue Valley Lumber Company

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 12 (AP)—The Rogue Valley Lumber company mill on the old Redwood highway at the south edge of Grants Pass was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday night with a loss estimated at between \$30,000 and \$40,000. The mill, property of T. J. Dostalik, was partially covered by insurance.  
Cause of the blaze, which was first discovered by neighbors shortly before 10 o'clock, was undetermined today. Dostalik had himself been at the mill at 9:30 p. m., and reported that there was no sign of fire at that hour.  
Several crews from the state forest patrol answered the call and with the help of the mill's own fire pump were able to keep the flames from spreading to the storage sheds and lumber nearby. The fire was restricted to the mill and equipment.

BREMERTON, Wash., Sept. 12 (AP)—Four navy enlisted men are dead and seven are under treatment at the Puget Sound navy yard hospital from suspected poisoning from an unknown agent, the navy yard public relations officer announced today.  
All of the men were attached to an aircraft carrier under repair at the navy yard.  
The navy reported the seven men under treatment were in satisfactory condition. It did not disclose their names, nor that of the ship.

bags over his shoes. This was to avoid the possibility—which the scientists said was remote—that shoes might pick up and carry unnoticed a particle of dirt that was still strongly emitting X-rays.  
**Glass Souvenirs**  
Within the center members of the party picked up souvenirs that consisted of pieces of the colored glass. Some were a quarter of an inch thick, others so thin that they crumbled at a touch. Here and there was an atomic glass "egg." When picked up, these "eggs" broke, revealing centers filled with dirt.  
Each souvenir was carried by its possessor to one or another of the scientists who had X-ray meters. The souvenir was held close to the meter and a dial reading showed whether the object was safe or whether it still had too much X-rays. Most of the objects were safe, by the meter, but the party was warned not to carry them in bare hands and not to use pieces for desk weights for a month or two until the rays weakened.

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# FRENCH-ITALIAN BORDER CHANGE ASKED OF BIG 5

plan to place the bulk of the Italian colonies under Italian trusteeship. This would remove Rome's sovereignty, but retain Rome's rule. The French view is that Italy must have an outlet for emigrants.  
5. The French demand all the East African area known as Fezzan. It is a strategic link between Lake Chad and North Africa which belonged half to France and half to Italy before 1935. At that time it was turned over to Italy. French diplomats say, by Pierre Laval.  
6. The French desire border rectifications on Tunisia's inland frontier with Italian colonies, seeking certain bases which are important on the desert routes.  
7. France wants restitution for goods stolen by the Italians during the war, such as locomotives and machine tools.  
8. France is insistent on at least the principle of Italian reparations. The French say they are not seeking any large sum for the general war damage but that they are anxious to get a small sum as a matter of principle.  
It appeared likely that France would be satisfied on most of her territorial demands, although there probably will be some debate over Eastern Libya
