

JEWISH HOLIDAY OBSERVED HERE BY SERVICEMEN

The Jewish New Year celebration, Rosh Hashanah, was observed in Klamath Falls last weekend by a gathering of servicemen that included members of the local navy and Marine Barracks, together with a contingent from the army personnel stationed at Camp Tulelake and Medford.

The festivities began Friday evening at sundown with a dinner given for the men at the USO. Evening services were conducted after dinner at the St. Paul's Episcopal church by Cpl. Milton Richmond of San Francisco, Calif. On Saturday morning additional services were held by Cpl. Richmond, to conclude the rituals.

Yom Kippur, the day of atonement, will be observed this weekend. The USO will again conduct the arrangements for the military personnel in this area, with the aid of the chaplain departments of the army, navy and Marine Barracks.

MERCY CREW GETS ROUGH TREATMENT

PORTLAND, Sept. 12 (AP)—Five American soldiers who parachuted into Manchuria with medicine for war prisoners at Camp Hoken were "roughly handled" by Japanese guards, a Portland colonel said.

In a letter to his wife here, Col. Harry A. Skerry—a prisoner in the camp—said the five-man group landed August 16. "As the local Nips knew nothing of the proposed surrender," he said, "our men were roughly handled until they finally convinced a Nip officer that Japan was surrendering on August 17 and that they had arrived with medicine for the prisoners of war."

It wasn't only the Japanese force that couldn't believe the surrender. The news was given to Skerry and his fellow-prisoners, too—"but we simply could not believe such a fantastic yarn of peace and the end of the war," Skerry is a survivor of Bataan.

Fujima And Mt. Shasta. Same Size, Sailor Writes

Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Zupan of 429 Commercial have heard from their son, Peter D. Zupan, Y 3/c with the navy, that he was aboard the USS Grimes in Tokyo bay. Following is a part of his letter written on August 30:

"They finally lifted the censorship regulations high enough for me to give you a few of my recent experiences. You at home undoubtedly knew that my ship was in on the recent operations around Japan, and today the occupation took place. It was really quite a simple task, as the only real hazards were the white flags of surrender that were stuck from every hilltop that could be viewed with the naked eye—they actually blinded the eye—well, that's exaggerating it quite a bit, but it was really swell to see them flying.

"We were practically heading home when we were assigned as part of the now famous Halsey's third fleet. We cruised around with them for quite some time, as you know from reading the papers back home. "Finally we were allowed to enter Sagami Wan, a big bay just south of the entrance to Tokyo bay. There we viewed the mighty, and I mean mighty fleet of the U. S. It made you feel as safe as if you were in your own back yard, not the back yard of the once powerful Japanese empire.

"The first night was one of anxiety and waiting. Naturally, we all knew that the Japs wouldn't try anything, but then you can't exactly tell what a Jap will do. I'm not very ex-

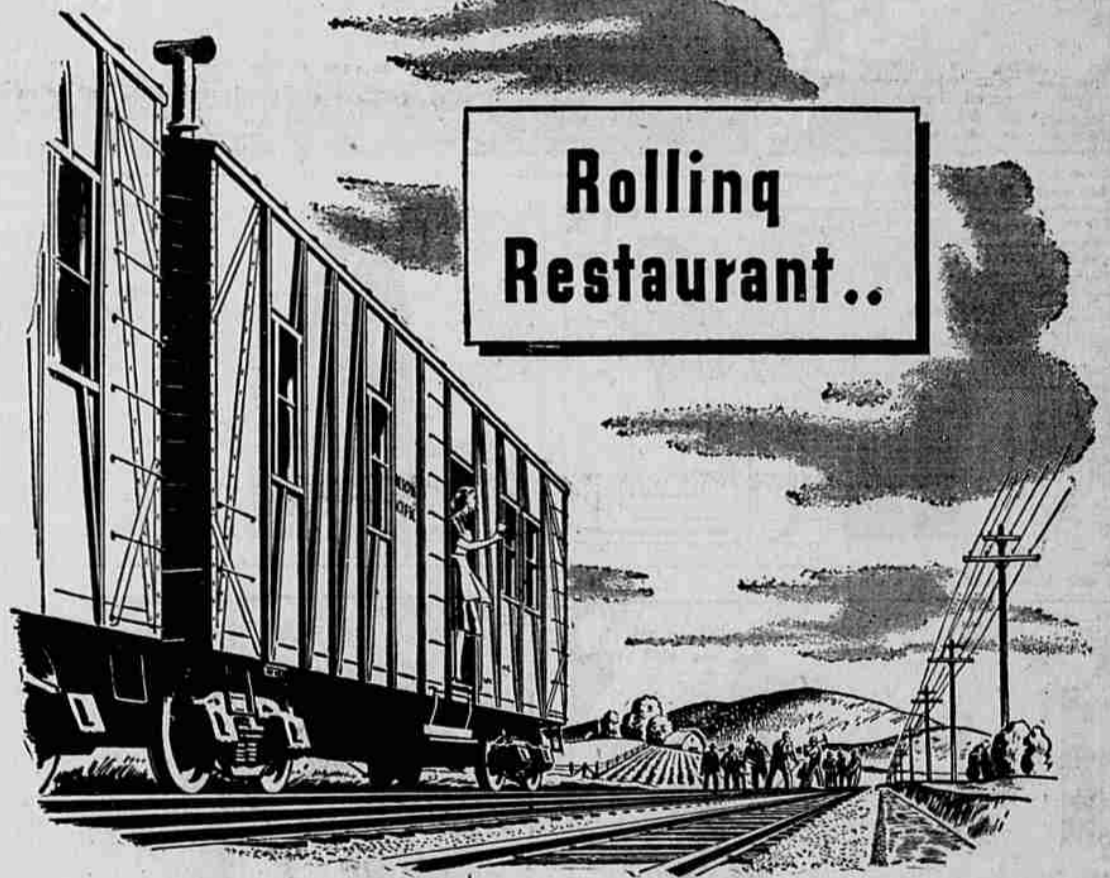
