

# OPA CONTINUES PLAN TO HOLD DOWN PRICES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—Despite angry dealer protests, OPA is going ahead with its announced plan for putting new consumer goods on the market at 1942 retail prices.

The agency has decided to turn down an appeal by a delegation of retailers for abandonment of its sharply disputed cost absorption policy.

Under that policy retailers and wholesalers must absorb, by trimming their profit margins, all or in some cases part of any price increase granted to manufacturers. This is to keep prices to the public from going any higher than those of three years ago.

The policy is in effect already for washing machines, aluminum ware and electric irons. It will be applied to any other consumer product coming back on the market if the manufacturer is given an increase to compensate for higher labor and materials costs.

Two weeks ago retailers, meeting with OPA, called the cost absorption policy "uneconomic, unsound and inequitable."

OPA listened but gave no indication of retreating. It pointed out the policy had been approved by President Truman in an executive order.

Now the agency is preparing a formal reply to the retailers. It will say that cost absorption is on the books to stay during reconversion.

## State Has Seven New Polio Cases

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—The state board of health reported seven new cases of poliomyelitis today, largest number for any week this year.

The report said there were 11 cases reported the same week last year and the 20 cases so far this year represented only 79 per cent of the 1944 figure.

## CASUALTY LISTS UNDERGO CHANGE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—The army gained but the navy lost men in today's latest revision of casualty reports from World War II.

The total now stands at 1,070,730 for all branches of the armed services. This is 278 more than last week's recapitulation.

Liberation of 285 more prisoners of war who previously had been listed as missing cut the army's casualty total down to 922,302, but the navy's total rose to 148,428, an increase of 563 over last week's figure.

Here are the latest figures for the army, together with those for last week: killed 205,045 and 203,379; wounded 571,608 and 571,589; missing 25,082 and 27,076; prisoners 120,567 and 119,643. The casualties are those reported through September 7.

The navy figures: killed 53,809 and 53,617; wounded 79,752 and 79,672; missing 11,262 and 10,947; prisoners 3605 and 3629.

## FIRE-FIGHTING UNIT RETURNS TO CAMP

FORT LEWIS, Sept. 13 (AP)—The 2822d general service regiment returned here yesterday from a successful conquest of the forest fire menace in Oregon.

The unit was thrown into the battle against recent serious blazes in the Oregon woods and worked throughout as a unit, employing the forest service radio network to greatest advantage in coordinating its efforts.

Residents in Scoggins valley, the Wilson river area, Dalles, Falls City, Forest Grove and Raymond, Wash., took the soldier fire-fighters into their homes and told forest service officers of their gratitude for the work of the army.

## OPA Boosts Rates In Logging Operations

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—OPA has approved an increase of 2 cents per 1000 feet over present maximum 13 cents for scaling and grading logs in the Pacific northwest, loggers were advised today.

The boost, effective September 17, affects 70 per cent of the work, including the Columbia river log scaling and grading bureau.
