

# PROPOSED AIR ROUTE TABBED AS 'WASTELAND'

SEATTLE, Sept. 13 (P)—The proposed air route to Alaska from Chicago via Edmonton, Alta., was described as the "Wasteland Route" yesterday by Attorney Samuel J. Wettrick, council for Pacific Northwest Oriental Airline committee.

Such a route could only "enable Chicago and New York to take from this region the business that has gone through the Seattle-Tacoma gateway for years," Wettrick declared at a committee meeting.

Air Vice Marshal G. R. Howsam, C. B., M. C., Royal Canadian air force, a Seattle visitor, told reporters he would discuss the cross-Canada route if permitted to mention both advantages and disadvantages.

**Supply Cost**

He cited, of the latter, the necessity of supplying airports along the route by a costly highway, the fact that gasoline and other supplies would cost more, and that there was little population in the region and small likelihood of appreciable economic development.

Its advantages, Howsam said, were shorter distance from the American east and middle west, many emergency landing fields, excellent airports at Edmonton, Grand Prairie, Fort St. John, Fort Nelson, Watson Lake, Whitehorse and Fairbanks.

# SHOW COMMITTEE TO PICNIC SUNDAY

Buckaroo Days committee will hold the 1945 picnic next Sunday, September 16, at Matthews. Mark on the Sprague river just four miles beyond Beatty. The practice of the committee of giving a picnic each fall for members of the American Legion and city officials who aid in the July rodeo shows, was started before the war and has been continued each year with the exception of 1944 when the picnic was omitted due to war time conditions.

SALEM, Sept. 13 (P)—Staff Sgt. Jacob Deshazer slept late this morning at the little white house on Oak street where he came home shortly before midnight last night.

The underweight Doolittle raider who arose from the dead so far as the western world at large was concerned 24 days ago when liberated from a Japanese prison camp, ate his favorite food—fried chicken—before he crawled between the sheets for his first night in his Salem home.

Deshazer entered the army from Madras.

Jacob Deshazer's homecoming is something his mother, Mrs. Hulda Andrus, has been looking forward to for years. Even after she had learned that her son was with the Doolittle fliers, after notification that men on that raid had been condemned to death in Japan, Mrs. Andrus lived in hope.

**Aie Fried Chicken**

The fried chicken her "boy" ate last night she had prepared with loving care, to go with the cakes brought in by the neighbors as their tribute to the sergeant. There were flowers on the table, too, gift from a neighbor's garden, although late summer blossoms bloom in profusion in the Andrus home yard.

**Morning Celebration**

Hiram Andrus, who married the sergeant's mother 27 years ago after the death of the little boy's father, was in on the early morning celebration as was Hel-

en Andrus, the sergeant's sister. Even while he ate the good American home cooking, Deshazer declared he would again eat rice.

And the Free Methodist parents told reporters they thought Jacob's decision to return to the Orient as a missionary "fine."

Brahma steer riding—Willie Burton and Glenn Tyler.

Northwest bucking contest—Seven of 19 cowhands were thrown. Outstanding were Cecil Bruce, Weiser; Lt. Bob Henry, Portland; Ross Dollard, Lakeview.

Calif roping—John Bowman, Oakdale, Calif., 16.7 seconds; Bill Linderman, Red Lodge, Mont., 17.4; Buster Hayes, Thermopolis, Wyo., 19.3.

Bull dogging—Jack Wade, Hal Kirk, Alberta, Can., 17.8 seconds; Bill MacMacken, Florence, Ariz., 18.4.

Steer roping—Everett Shaw, Stonewall, Okla., 18.2 seconds; Hugh Bennett, Colorado Springs,

22.9; Homer Pettigrew, Spring-er, N. M., 24.

The most spectacular bronc ride of the first day show which saw 8000 persons in the crowd was by Bill Linderman, Red Lodge, Mont., who stayed with the famous bucking horse Badger Mountain for an outstanding ride before being thrown.
