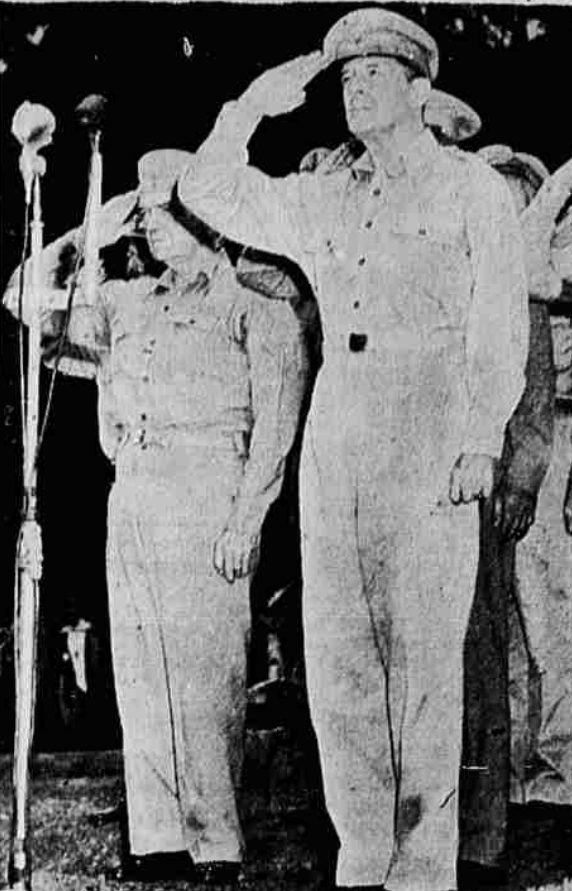

## NEW MERCHANT ASSOCIATION RECEIVES OKAY

Action to permit the dissolution of the retail trade committee of the chamber of commerce, to be supplanted by the new Klamath Merchants association, was taken by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce yesterday.

Paul Skeen, president of the merchants group, explained that the association will require that all members belong to the chamber. John Houston, director in charge of retail trade on the board, will be liaison officer between the chamber and the merchants association.

Actions taken by the association will not have to be approved by the chamber board. Skeen pointed out that there are many matters which are not necessarily of interest to the county chamber of commerce, but are definitely local Klamath Falls affairs of interest to the merchants.

At the meeting Wednesday noon the directors heard a number of "master plan" reports from various committees and all were adopted.

A suggestion that a wig-wag signal be removed from the S. P. tracks at the crossing of the old Keno-State Line road, and

be placed on the O. C. and E. crossing at Hager, was left for further investigation. The Junior chamber made the proposal, but it was not clear just where the wig-wag is now located.

## East Main Sewer Project Continues

Four hundred and fifty feet of sanitary sewer are being laid parallel to the present system on Main street near the public health center, City Engineer E. A. Thomas said today.

The work was started two weeks ago and should be completed in another week. The cost of \$1200 will be paid for by property owners being served, Thomas said.

The present system was found inadequate for the needs in the district, and the project now underway will supplement the old system.
