

NAVY SPENDING SLASH BACKED BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP) President Truman asked congress today to cut the navy's spending authority by nearly \$17,000,000,000.

He also recommended that congress consider a complete review of existing legislation authorizing the construction of naval vessels.

The reductions in navy funds proposed by Mr. Truman would apply to appropriations and spending authorizations for the present fiscal year, which began July 1, and to some appropriations which would carry over into the next fiscal year under existing legislation.

Savings were permitted in part, the president explained in a letter to congress, because of discharges of enlisted personnel, the cutting down of the ship-building program, and reduced expenses for maintaining and operating ships and navy yards, keeping up naval aviation and providing naval ordnance.

"In making these recommendations for reductions," Mr. Truman said, "consideration has been given to the tremendous problem of demobilization and the yet undetermined requirements for a peacetime navy."

"As indicated in my letter of September 5, 1945, I plan a continuing review of naval appropriations with the view to recommending further adjustments as conditions warrant."

Crowds Jam Pendleton For Famous Round-Up Parade

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 14 (AP) Roundup visitors, so numerous they overflowed Pendleton beds and were placed in hotels 50 miles away, jammed wild west-adorned streets today for the famed "Westward-Ho!" parade.

Some 4000 of the 11,000 to 13,000 out-of-towners crowded the "Happy Canyon" nightly show, a pageant of the old west which this year flaunted Hollywood-designed costumes and a two-year-old Indian whose war dance had a jitterbug flavor.

An even larger crowd was expected for the mammoth "Westward-Ho!" procession of every type of conveyance which crossed the plains.

Rodeo events go into the third day this afternoon, with Bill Macken, Florence, Ariz., Gene Rambo, Shandon, Calif., and Bill Lindermann, Red Lodge, Mont., top contenders for the championship.

All three, along with Lindermann's brother, Bud, have turned in top performances. Macken has two legs on the \$5300 trophy which goes to a three-time winner, and Rambo captured one leg last year. Bill Lindermann is the leader for the nation's all-around rodeo title.

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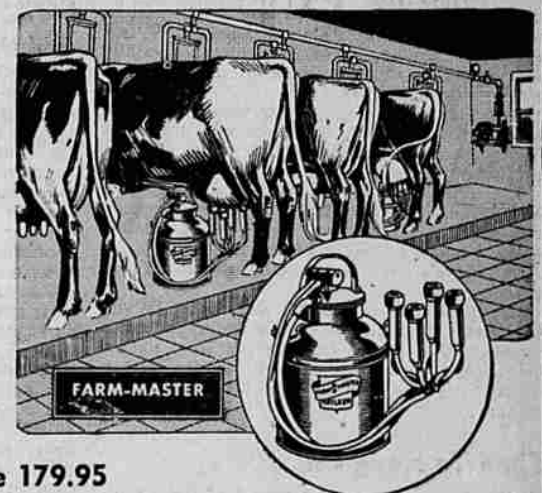
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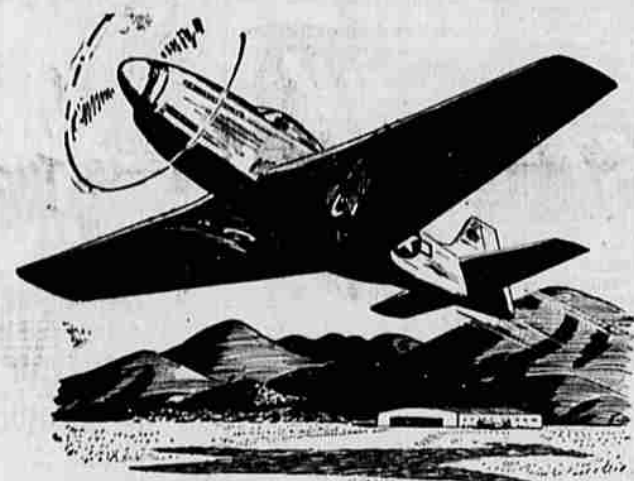
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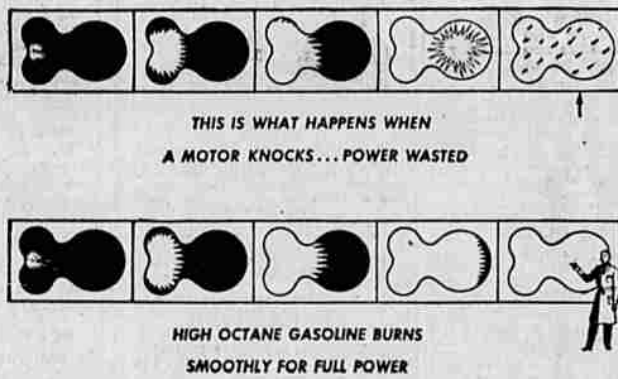
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
