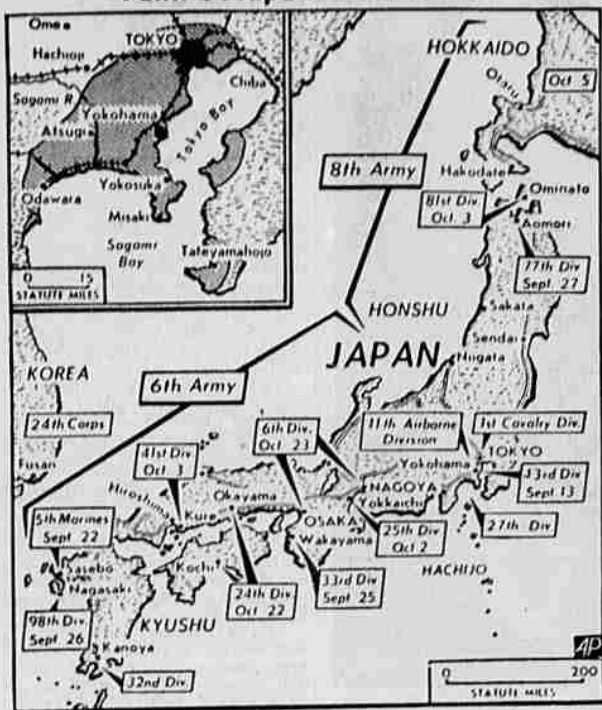

Jobs And Jobless Problems Deal Senate Dual Blow

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—Two big measures wrapping up the biggest postwar problem of all—jobs—moved through senate machinery today. Both are headed for contests involving basic theories of government.

Here is the situation:
1. Jobless pay — the finance committee arranged to send to the full senate today a bill for emergency unemployment compensation. It carries provisions designed to make sure that most full time workers get state payments — at present rates — for as long as 26 weeks if they are out of work that long. But the bill is the guarantee of a top figure of \$25 a week asked by President Truman. Further it says a state can stay in or out of the new federal aid program, as it desires.

2. Employment guarantees — the full banking committee was called to meet Tuesday to consider a subcommittee-approved draft of the so-called full employment bill. This draft declares it to be the responsibility of the federal government to see that all Americans able and wanting to work shall have jobs. The stage for further action on both measures was set late yesterday, when the finance committee voted to send the revised jobless pay bill to the floor and when the banking subcommittee completed its controversial work.

KF DEALER VIEWS FORD CAR DISPLAY

First display of the new Ford passenger car on the Pacific coast was witnessed in San Francisco yesterday by Elmer Balsiger, local Ford dealer, at a preview meeting in the St. Francis hotel. Host at the gathering of 150 dealers from throughout the Richmond factory branch area was Arthur S. Hatch, regional manager of the Ford Motor company. Balsiger returned home Friday.

Balsiger reported that present plans call for a simultaneous public "unveiling" of the new Fords on the Pacific coast late in September. By that time, cars now en route to all dealers will provide models for both showroom display and demonstration. Full details and specifications about these first postwar production cars to reach the public will be made public when the new Fords are put on display, Balsiger said.

However, it was apparent from first glimpse of the cars that the Ford factory has not been content with a "warmed-over" model. The front appearance has been modernized and many interior changes could be noted.

AG APPOINTMENTS LISTED BY STATE

SALEM, Sept. 14 (AP)—The appointment of Arthur W. Cole as supervisor for feeds, fertilizers and economic poisons and of William J. Ingram as commercial feeds chemist for the state department of agriculture was announced today by O. K. Beals, chief of the division of foods and dairies.

Cole holds a master's degree from Oregon State college and has been Smith-Hughes instructor in Klamath county for 10 years. Ingram also holds a master's degree from Oregon State college and did graduate work at the University of California and University of Wisconsin. He was for three years chemist for a cement concern at Oswego and he earlier taught at Grays Harbor junior college, Aberdeen, Wash.

THOMAS PREDICTS END OF TIRE RATION
AKRON, O., Sept. 14 (AP)—Earlier-than-expected end of passenger tire rationing was predicted today by E. J. Thomas, president of Goodyear Tire and Rubber company.

Thomas reported Goodyear's passenger tire production would reach its pre-war peak by the first of the year and "shortly thereafter, owing to the substantially increased capacities installed to meet war demands, would soar to new record heights."

Thomas predicted a jump in imports of natural rubber to the U. S. within a few months, "possibly reaching 400,000 long tons or more for 1946." Increases in per cent of natural rubber used will start in the larger sized truck and off-the-road tires as soon as it becomes available, he commented.

The Goodyear executive said inner tubes of butyl rubber, a war-developed synthetic far superior in resistance qualities to natural rubber, soon would be available for large size passenger tires.
