

STATE CROPS SUFFER FROM RAIN, FROST

PORTLAND, Sept. 14 (AP)—Rain caused some crop damage in western Oregon and frost a small loss in the eastern part of the state last week, the weather bureau reported yesterday.

Medford's temperature of 98 was the week's high, followed by Roseburg with 95. Baker and Madras both hit the 26 low. North Bend's 74 precipitation exceeded Pendleton's 70. In a few portions of the state, freezing temperatures brought an end to the growing season.

Harvest Program
Spring grain harvest progressed last week; corn was damaged in eastern localities by frost; rain did some damage to peaches, but picking of peaches and bartlett pears continued, and some early apples were harvested. There was some loss of hops from the rain but picking made good progress. There was considerable movement of celery, onions, cantaloupes and watermelons.

Harvest of canning beans passed its peak and tomato harvest was in full swing. Fall lettuce in Malheur county was doing well and peppermint was being harvested. Pastures were improved by rain along the coast and in northwestern counties, but generally needed rain elsewhere. Some cattle were being brought down from summer ranges and a few shipped to market.

Newsprint Control Abolishment Asked

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (AP)—Complete abolition of all controls over the domestic consumption of newsprint on December 31 has been recommended by American newspaper publishers and tentatively accepted by the war production board, it was learned reliably yesterday.

At a meeting in Washington on Tuesday and Wednesday the WPB also accepted on the same basis a recommendation by the newspaper publishers advisory committee for a boost in newsprint usage for the period beginning October 1.

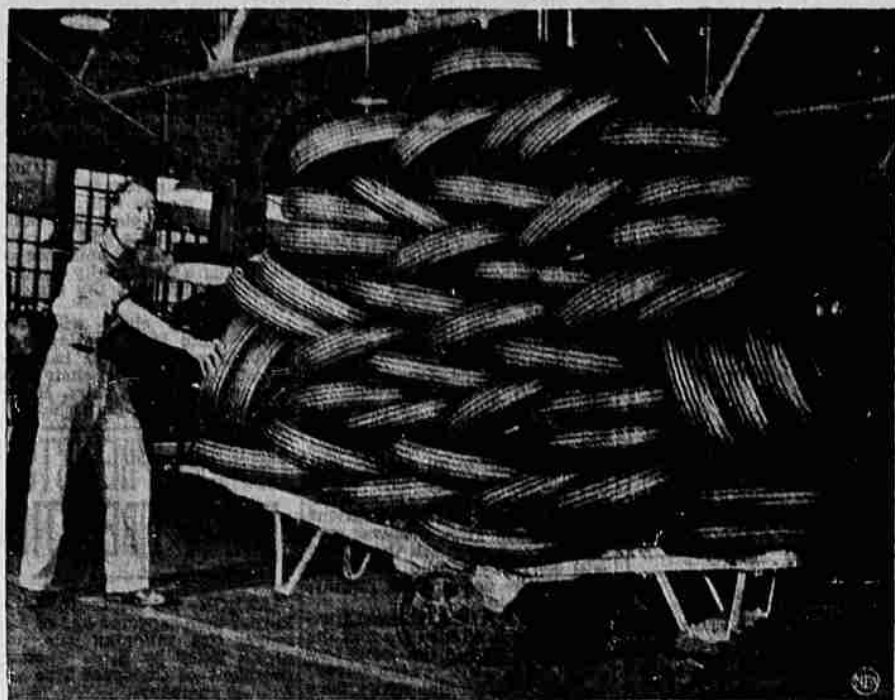

DISCHARGE BUTTONS AVAILABLE TO VETS

Any individual entitled to wear the honorable discharge emblem or lapel button for service and who has not been issued the authorized allowance of these emblems may obtain them from the army or navy by presenting evidence of honorable discharge or separation from the service, according to a joint announcement today by Seattle army service forces depot and headquarters 13th naval district.

Army veterans may obtain the devices by applying in person at the property office, 4784 East Marginal way, Seattle, or by written application to Commanding Officer, Seattle Army Service Forces Depot, 4735, E. Marginal way.

Persons who have been discharged from the navy, coast guard or marines may obtain pins from the nearest navy recruiting office.

Applicants, other than officers, must present an honorable discharge certificate, a certificate of service, or a special order announcing retirement. Officers applying for buttons or emblems may, in lieu of either of the above mentioned certificates, present one true copy of orders or another instrument relieving them from active duty.

Applications should not be sent to Washington, D. C.

Mosquito Killing Aid Requested

Yank Broadcaster For Japs Filed Complaint Against US

LEWISTON, Idaho, Sept. 14 (AP)—Mark Lewis Streeter, pre-war carpenter and operator of a small farm here, whom Gen. Douglas MacArthur recently had arrested at Yokohama for alleged broadcasting of propaganda for the Japanese, once filed a "complaint" against the United States government, the Lewiston Morning Tribune said today.

Streeter told the paper on April 28, 1941, that he had filed a complaint against "the board of directors of the United States of America, a corporation," with Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes.

Streeter's Message
"The plaintiff prays for judgment against the defendant for malfeasance and nonfeasance of office in handling the business of said corporation," the paper quoted the complaint, "and asks that the business of this United States of America be put on a solvent basis of equality and justice for all."

RETURNS HOME

MERCHANT MARINE OFFICERS NEEDED

The accelerated discharge program whereby millions of veterans will be returned to this country within the next year has increased the need of licensed officers in the Merchant Marine, it was announced today by Captain H. J. Tiedemann, Pacific District Operations Officer for the Maritime Service.

In order to bring these servicemen home on schedule enrollments in the USMS Officers School at Alameda remain at present standards. All men with 14 months sea time in either the deck or engine department of an ocean going vessel are eligible to attend the Officers School, where a four months course of training prepares an Officer-Candidate to sit for his license as a Third Assistant Engineer or Third Mate.

Enrollees receive \$126 per month, plus uniforms, meals and quarters.
