

TRUMAN LEAVES FOR WEEKEND VISIT AT HOME

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—President Truman took off from the National airport at 1:37 p. m. EWT, today on a flight to Missouri for a weekend with his home folks.

The president and Mrs. Truman boarded the big presidential C-54, the "Sacred Cow" with Senate Majority Leader Barkley, who planned to ride with them as far as Paducah, Ky., where he will disembark for a home state speech.

The schedule called for the arrival of the plane at the Paducah airport at 9:30 p. m., CWT. Another stop was scheduled for Scott Field, Ill., where Miss Reathel Odum, Mrs. Truman's secretary, will leave the plane for an Illinois vacation.

Drive to Home

Upon arrival at Kansas City, about 8:25 p. m., CWT, the president and Mrs. Truman will drive to their old white frame home at Independence, a dozen miles away.

They will spend Friday and Saturday nights there and make at least one trip to nearby rural Grandview for a visit with the president's mother, 92-year-old Mrs. Martha Truman.

Mrs. Alvin J. Awoola, of New York, a former Independence resident and long-time friend of the Trumans, will make the round trip flight with the party, which also includes Miss Rose Conway, the president's personal secretary. The president plans to return to Washington at 8:50 p. m., EWT, Sunday. Mrs. Truman will remain in Independence for several days.

FLEET TO EVACUATE 350 ALLIED PWS

OMINATO ANCHORAGE, Japan, Sept. 14 (AP)—Three ships of the North Pacific fleet were dispatched this afternoon to Hakodate to evacuate 350 allied prisoners of war from central Hokkaido camps, after rain and heavy fog prevented ready movement of transport airplanes.

Rescue vessels are the American escort carrier Kitkun Bay and destroyer Howarth, and the British destroyer Barflour, temporarily attached to this North Pacific force. They will take prisoners aboard at Hakodate, 120 miles north of Ominato, tomorrow morning, then steam directly for Yokohama.

A carrier plane pilot sent a message tonight to Vice Adm. Frank J. Fletcher aboard the USS Panamint saying Lt. Col. James P. Devereux of Wake Island fame was being delayed at the Chitose naval air station by bad weather. It said he would be brought to Ominato as soon as the weather cleared. Devereux was freed several days ago from a prisoner of war camp near Chitose.

Man Recovers From Accidental Shooting

BURNS, Sept. 14 (AP)—Accidentally shot while attempting to kill a coyote, Robert Carlson, prominent business man, was reportedly recovering in a hospital here today.

Carlson, owner of the Ranch Supply Hardware & Implement company, was driving on Silver creek, 30 miles west of here. He saw the coyote. The gun was discharged as he attempted to get it from the back of his truck, shattering his leg above and below the knee.

Several blood and plasma transfusions have been given.

Tongue Point Base Status Discussed

ASTORIA, Sept. 14 (AP)—Future status of Tongue Point base will be discussed by the house naval affairs committee, Representative Mott (R-Ore.) advised Astorians today.

Rumors that the station will be made inactive have been circulating.

"I have had a conference with John L. Sullivan, undersecretary of the navy for air," Mott said. "He has ordered Tongue Point restored to its original status and said he will agree to separate hearings on Tongue Point before the naval affairs committee prior to any further action by the navy department to change its status."

FOE MEETING

SPOKANE, Sept. 14—Delegates of series of the Fraternal Order of Eagles in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and British Columbia will meet here Saturday and Sunday to plan with national officers a peace-time service program, it was announced yesterday.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (AP)—Radio networks NBC and ABC returned to normal operation today after a 26 hour strike by approximately 500 union broadcast engineers.

The engineers began returning to their jobs in New York and other major cities last night. The walkout ended after officials of the companies and the union, the National Association of Broadcast Engineers and Technicians (NABET) agreed to resume negotiations today for a new wage contract.

Fire Destroys Grain Shed At Henley

TOJO'S SUICIDE MESSAGE REVEALED

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 14 (AP)—Former Premier Hideki Tojo left a carefully worded statement saying "In death I shall become a guardian of my nation," before he attempted to kill himself with a revolver Tuesday, it was learned today.

The statement was intended to become a part of the philosophical "last words" of the famed men of Japan, which is the backbone of the Bushido code for Nippon's warriors.

The statement, described as a masterpiece of calligraphy written with a brush on silk paper read: "Rather than expose my shame to the world by living, in death I shall become a guardian of my nation. (Signed) Hideki."

The note was addressed to "Mura," presumably a member of the imperial household.

It was learned Tojo's income tax form, incompleted when he was picked up, showed he carried only 9000 yen insurance. This is equivalent to \$600 at the current exchange rate of 15 yen to the dollar.
