

CALIFORNIA DEER SEASON OPENS

Hunters Roll In To Set Up Camps In Readiness For Big Opening Sunday

With the deer season scheduled to open in California Sunday, September 16, hunters are congregating in the Tulalake area in huge numbers, setting up camps in readiness for the opening day. The season extends to Monday, October 15, inclusive.

Siskiyou and Modoc counties are the two areas in which Klamath sportsmen are most interested. In Modoc county, the bag limit is one deer, three points or better, and Siskiyou is a two-deer county.

Big Season

Matt Finnigan, local hunting enthusiast and owner of a new sporting goods store here, said this morning that this season will be one of the biggest in years. Nimrods are rolling into Redding, Red Bluff and other California towns in full force in preparation for sunup of the opening day.

Matt stated that a non-resident hunting license costs \$10 with an additional \$1 for deer tags. However, servicemen are considered California residents, he said, and he is selling them resident licenses at \$2 a copy and an additional \$1 for tags.

Influx Of Hunters

Forest officers of the Modoc national forest predict the greatest influx of deer hunters in several years with the cessation of gasoline rationing and other travel restrictions. Many hunters who were unable to get to their favorite hunting spots during the war years have signified their intention of returning this year to resume their annual hunt for the great mule deer.

The outlook at present indicates the first few days of the season will be relatively hot and dry with high forest fire risk. Not many bucks have been seen by forest riders and other travelers in the forest, but it is anticipated that cooler nights may be stirring them around.

The Modoc forest is placing special fire patrols in the field as a service to hunters, to issue campfire permits, to give information on water holes and camp sites, road conditions and other useful information.

The patrolmen will also seek the full cooperation for fire prevention of all the hunters in the area.

Forest Fires Numerous

Forest fires this year have been numerous and there have been inquiries into the possibilities of some forests being closed. This is entirely up to the hunters themselves, whether or not the season stays on or has to be closed because of too many fires caused by hunters.

The forest service maintains that good hunters are an additional assistance in preventing fires that some careless person starts and urges full cooperation during the deer season.

Baseball's big series of 1945 is at hand as Detroit invades Washington for a vital five-game set that should determine the American league winner.

If either the Tigers or the Senators, who trail the leaders by only a half game, can sweep the series or take four of the contests, the race will be over for all practical purposes.

After the Bengals leave town Monday night, the Nats will have only five games to play and Steve O'Neill's gang, which has been on top since June 12, will have but eight more to go, four each with Cleveland and St. Louis.

Neither side can afford to hold back a thing in the season's first real crucial man-to-man test although Detroit's list of "cripples" includes Hank Greenberg, Eddie Mayo and Hal Newhouse. All three may see action in today's doubleheader but none of the trio is at his peak.

Both contenders had tight squeaks yesterday, the Tigers downing Philadelphia, 1-0, in a game cut to five innings by rain and decided by one lucky run. Washington had to come up with three in the last of the ninth to trim Cleveland, 6-5.

Solons Rally

Just when the Senators' fans had given up on their club, trailing Cleveland, 5-3, with one out and nobody on in the ninth, the challengers started to rally. Joe Kuhel's triple, two singles, a walk, and Al Chiochick's error tied the score. Then Reliever Pete Center walked George Case with the bases loaded to lose the game.

The two losses suffered by the St. Louis Cardinals at the hands of Leo Durocher's Brooklyn Dodgers, 7-3 and 6-1, can doom the Red Birds' hope for the National flag.

The Cubs had given the Birds an opening by splitting two with the Phillies, bowing to Hugh Mulcahy, 4-3, but even- ing matters, 6-0, on Claude Pas- seau's 17th victory.

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Vetrano Boots Field Goal To Upset Bombers, 17 To 14

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15 (AP)
The alert fourth air force fliers, with Joe Vetrano booting a story-book field goal in the last 30 seconds of play, last night upset the powerful second air force Superbombers, 17-14, in the coliseum's grid opener.

Vetrano's place kick from the Bomber 18-yard line broke a deadlock which had been engineered by the Superbombers' Frankie Sinkwich, former Georgia and Detroit Lions' force

who ran wild in the third quarter.

After the fliers had taken a commanding 14-0 lead in the first period, Sinkwich sparked his team to 27 and 30-yard touchdown drives. Ray Evans, Kansas wingback, scored on a one-yard end run and Sinkwich tallied on a four-yard off tackle slant. Don Fambrough, Texas, placekicked one extra point, and Sinkwich booted the tying digit.

All of the fliers' scoring resulted from heads-up capitalizing on breaks, with Jake Leicht of Oregon and John Strzykalski, Marquette, the chief thorns for the Superbombers from Colorado Springs.

Strzykalski intercepted a Sinkwich pass and ran 21 yards to set up the first flier tally, scored by Ray Renfro, Washington state, fullback, after a 29-yard march. The second touchdown came on a 32-yard end run by Gene Meeks, Kentucky, after Guard Garland Gregory recovered a fumble. Vetrano, 170-pounder from Mississippi Southern, booted both conversions.

New York Yankee Coach On Sidelines
