LAKEVIEW—Mrs. Arminta Kafader, believed to have been the oldest citizen of Lake county, died Saturday at the age of 96 years, 10 months and nine days.

Mrs. Kafader was born in Missouri on November 29, 1848. When she was six years of age, the family moved to Missouri flat in the Applegate valley of western Oregon. Here she was married and later moved to Lake county.

She was the mother of nine children, seven boys and two girls, all living but one son. The children range in ages from 35 to 79.

Two Local Men Get Navy Discharges

Discharged from the navy under the point system last week at Seattle were two Klamath Falls men.

They were Lt. Cmdr. John M. Babcock, 2051 Erie, and John W. Pitts Jr., aviation chief machinists mate, USNR, of 5220 Avalon.

Babcock has been the naval officer in charge of construction at the Marine Barracks since the barracks opened about a year and a half ago.

WESTERN AIR LINES ARGUE CAB REPORT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 15.—Western Air Lines today revealed the filing of a spirited brief with the Civil Aeronautics board reiterating the airline's insistence that it is best qualified to link the Pacific northwest to California in competition with the existing west coast service of United Air Lines.

Filing of Western Air's brief with the CAB results from an adverse recommendation made by the CAB examined on July 17, 1945. The examiner recommended that the CAB award the San Francisco-Seattle route to Southwest Airways, a newcomer to the air transport field. Southwest Airways was endorsed as a feeder-route operator, whereas Western Air had proposed northward extension of its present trunk-line system.

In today's brief rebutting the examiner's adverse recommendation, Western Air faced particular stress on two factors. The company pointed out that the weather conditions and mountainous terrain of the west coast are no place for fledgling airlines to experiment with large multi-engine equipment and unseasoned personnel. The company emphasized also that, as the oldest air carrier in the country and the only major airline headquartered in the west, it is best qualified by experience and interest to give the highest quality of service to communities located on new trunk-line air routes in the west.

JAP SHIP SLATED FOR ATOMIC TEST

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—The New York Times says today in a dispatch from Tokyo that the damaged 35,000-ton Japanese battleship Nagato, which was taken over by the U. S. navy at the Yokosuka naval base, will be towed 500 miles to sea where an atomic bomb will be dropped on her in an experiment that may determine the future form of the world's navies.

After relating that the Nagato had withstood an attack by 500 United States naval planes, the Times dispatch continues with regard to the atomic experiment:

"That is the present plan of the United States navy which wants to ascertain these details: whether the bomb will cause the destruction of a single ship; what it will do to a task force; what effect it will have on the water."

Great Experiment
"The navy hopes to obtain the answers in one of the greatest experiments of its type since Brig. Gen. William L. (Billy) Mitchell sank four warships from the air in the early nineteen twenties."

Continuing, the Times dispatch says:

"Reports from Hiroshima and Nagasaki indicate that the force of the explosion is up and out, not down. From the navy's viewpoint, the most dangerous effect of the atomic bomb could be under water, where the pressure of water greatly magnifies the effect of a torpedo or a mine."
