

LABOR HEAD WOULD UMPIRE FOR DISPUTES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach looked confidently to the White House today for a signal to "get right square in the middle" of Detroit's troubled work situation.

The signal is expected to be a reorganization of Schwellenbach's department to designate it as the government's umpire over the multiplying labor disputes that already are plaguing reconversion.

The cabinet officer told reporters Mr. Truman would announce the reorganization—along the lines Schwellenbach proposed nearly six weeks ago—at the president's 1 p. m. (PWT) news conference today.

Although he said he was not getting quite what he asked for, Schwellenbach added:

"We are going to get enough to do a job."

It was understood this would take the form principally of authority over labor disputes from beginning to end.

Schwellenbach declared that as soon as the White House announcement comes "we will get right square in the middle of the Detroit situation."

Two major factors are involved in that automotive center:

1. 50,000 Ford Motor company workers have been laid off because of strikes at suppliers' plants.

2. CIO-United Auto Workers have announced they will petition today for a strike vote at all General Motors plants if the company rejects the union's demands for a 30 cent wage increase.

BATTERED BODY OF 4-YEAR-OLD FOUND

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 18 (CP)—The most intensive search in the history of Vancouver ended last night with the finding of the battered body of four-year-old Dianne Blunt buried under three inches of dirt in an unused garage 25 yards from her East Hastings district home. She had been missing since last Tuesday.

Police said the child's face was badly battered and the back of her head crushed in. Officers said a widespread search is being made for "a murder suspect."

Discovery of the body was made while hundreds of citizens were engaged in a search of bushland surrounding the child's home. Last Sunday an estimated 7000 men and women, servicemen and Boy Scouts combed the city without finding a clue.

Rewards totalling \$775 were offered by citizens for information leading to the finding of the child. Dianne's father, E. J. Blunt, is a veteran of 4½ years with the Canadian army.

SALEM, Sept. 18 (AP)—Reseeding of the Tillamook burn area of about 250,000 acres will begin in December, State Forester N. S. Rogers said today.

He said forestry crews would plant about 250,000 two-year-old fir and cedar trees each month. In addition, there will be experimental seeding by airplane and by hand.

The area has been swept by fire in 1933, 1939 and again this summer.

The crews also will remove snags to eliminate fire hazards.
