

SCHOOL LAW TO BE ENFORCED IN CITY, COUNTY

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson today called attention of Klamath people to the terms of the compulsory education law passed at the last session of the legislature, and announced that Lloyd Seely has been named truant officer for the city and county school systems. Seely has served as truant officer in schools in the area for several years.

Here is Peterson's report on the list of the new attendance law:

Children from seven to 16 years of age must attend a full term of school in the district where their parents reside, with the following exceptions:

A. Children attending private schools or receiving approved home instruction.

B. Children who are high school graduates.

C. Children who are physically unable. A physician's statement to this effect may be required.

D. Children whose attendance at school would cause a hardship in the family; or whose attendance at school would prove educationally unprofitable, provided such children have completed the eighth grade.

Parents or guardians failing to keep children in school according to the law may be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$100; and a jail sentence of not less than two days nor more than 30 days; or both fine and imprisonment.

Children between the ages of 16 and 18 must be in school or legally employed. If employed, they must attend part time school of not less than five hours per week unless they are high school graduates.

Persons employing children between the ages of 14 and 18 shall permit attendance at part time school where such school has been established by the district unless such children are high school graduates.

Lloyd Seely has been appointed truant officer jointly by Klamath county school district and the city schools.

DRAFT DEFERMENT CONDITIONS TOLD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—From now on most high school boys will not have to enter military service until they have been graduated.

The conditions required for postponement of induction are these:

1. A boy must have entered high school or a similar institution before he became 18.

2. His course of instruction must be pursued "continuously and satisfactorily."

If he meets these two conditions, he may ask for a draft board postponement until he had been graduated, or until he reaches his 20th birthday, whichever is sooner.

Selective service also announced last night that college or university students who enrolled before reaching 18 may have their induction delayed in order to complete the current school quarter or semester.

Seaside Doctor Named To Board

SALEM, Sept. 19 (AP)—Dr. Otto C. Hagmeier, Seaside, was appointed by Governor Earl Snell today to the state board of health, succeeding Dr. Thomas D. Robertson, The Dalles, who died last week. The term ends in January, 1949.

Dr. Hagmeier, who has practiced medicine since 1906, was a medical corps captain in the first World war, and served as a medical corps captain from 1932 to 1940 in the 24th coast artillery of the Oregon national guard. He has been city health officer at Seaside for several years.

Anderson Gets Navy Discharge

Charles C. Anderson, 25, son of Oscar Anderson, Baldwin hotel, arrived here yesterday from Seattle, where he was discharged from the navy after three-and-a-half years of service.

He held the rate of pharmacist's mate, first class, and has been stationed at various naval bases in the United States while in the service.

STRAW VOTE FAVORS INDIAN CITIZENSHIP

A. M. Skeen, who said he is chairman of the Progressive Indian committee, has announced that a recent straw vote on the question of full citizenship for Indians resulted in 2717 affirmative votes and four negative votes.

The vote was invited by the Indian group, headed by Mr. and Mrs. Wade Crawford, which is sponsoring an Indian citizenship bill in congress.

Skeen said that comments were written on some of the ballots, of which these are samples:

"This should have been done long ago."

"The Indians have been robbed long enough."

"The Indians have lived under dictators long enough."

"I think the Indians should be full citizens as all other Americans."

"I believe the Indian property and money should be taken out of corrupt politics."

"I have known the Indians for more than 50 years. I have done business with them. Given the opportunity to think for themselves I believe they can and will take care of themselves."

"By all means 'Yes.' I do not believe in communism, collectivism, tribalism or any other ism."

"Give the Indians freedom — what they have fought for in this war."
