

WOMAN INJURED IN FALL FROM BICYCLE

CRATER LAKE, Ore.—While bicycling down the road from the watchman lookout parking area on September 14, Mrs. Margaret E. Jump, 33, struck a loose rock in the road and was thrown head first from her bicycle, landing on a pile of rocks at the side of the road and receiving multiple cuts, bruises and abrasions on her head, shoulder, back and limbs.

Her husband, Dr. E. B. Jump, who is an instructor in the College of Dentistry at the University of California, Berkeley, was just ahead of her when the accident occurred. His wife was knocked partly unconscious from the fall. By the time he reached her side, Fireguard Alan Kunz, who was just leaving the park at the termination of his summer work, arrived in the family car and brought Mrs. Jump to park headquarters for first aid.

After treatment of wounds and for shock, she had recovered sufficiently to continue her journey home the following morning. The jumps had bicycled 450 miles on their summer vacation trip, and were on route home to Berkeley when the accident occurred.

FRENCH TREATMENT OF NAZI PWS TOLD

PARIS Sept. 19 (AP)—The conservative newspaper *Figaro*, sharply criticizing French treatment of German prisoners, said today many of the prisoners were systematically starved and savagely beaten.

"In a number of camps are violated, at the expense of the Germans, not only international rules governing war prisoners but general laws governing respect for human dignity," the newspaper said in an editorial.

Food destined for prisoners disappears before it reaches its destination, and some camps are full of living skeletons, "nearly like those of the German camps," the newspaper said, adding that "deaths by starvation are numerous."

The editorial said some prisoners are forced to work on the removal of mines, without any detecting equipment, "condemning them to a quick death."

'Cut Grass With Bayonets', At Camp, Soldier Reports

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—A 37-year-old buck private testified today he was "being railroaded" by army officers or the war department attempted to stop soldiers, sailors and marines from writing or contacting congressmen "that is a violation of good discipline of the army of the U. S."

Pvt. George L. Mark, who was a barber supply salesman in Cleveland, O., until drafted four months ago, told the senate military committee that he and other soldiers at nearby Fort Belvoir, Va., "cut grass with bayonets." He said this was done to keep them busy.

Chairman Thomas (D-Utah)

remarked to the bald army rookie that if army officers or the war department attempted to stop soldiers, sailors and marines from writing or contacting congressmen "that is a violation of good discipline of the army of the U. S."

Mark said he was being "railroaded" from nearby Belvoir to Camp Shelby, Miss., later today because he had told Washington newspapers about the bayonet grass cutting and lack of morale among soldiers at the engineer post.

"I know my goose is cooked,"

said the private who has a wife and three children, as senators and a score of soldiers and sailors joined him in laughter. "But I don't mind because somebody has to speak for the ordinary GI."

Senator Johnson (D-Colo.), who has been critical of army and navy demobilization plans, expressed sympathy with Private Marks.

"This soldier is being sent off, not to Siberia, but to Mississippi," Johnson said. "This certainly is a warning to other soldiers on what to expect if they contact members of congress."
