DIRECTED VERDICT ASKED IN SUIT

Motions for a directed verdict were made yesterday in circuit court by attorneys for the defense and prosecution in a \$10,000 damage suit against the Crane mills and Ralph E. McCumber, in which Bessie Opal Reeves is the plaintiff.

She is represented by Ben Anderson of Portland and W. Lamar Townsend and R. B. Maxwell acted for the defendants. The motion for a directed verdict was made after lengthy testimony had been given by five defense witnesses, including McCumber. He was the alleged operator of a parked truck when a car in which the plaintiff was a passenger collided with the rear end of the vehicle on September 13, 1944, at about 9:30 p. m. on highway 68 two miles outside of Bly.

The complaint charged that the plaintiff received permanent injuries as the result of the crash which was due to the negligence of the driver, McCumber, in not placing flares on the road while the truck was parked.

After the motions for a directed verdict were made, the jury was automatically discharged and Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg took the matter under advisement and will render a decision in the near future.

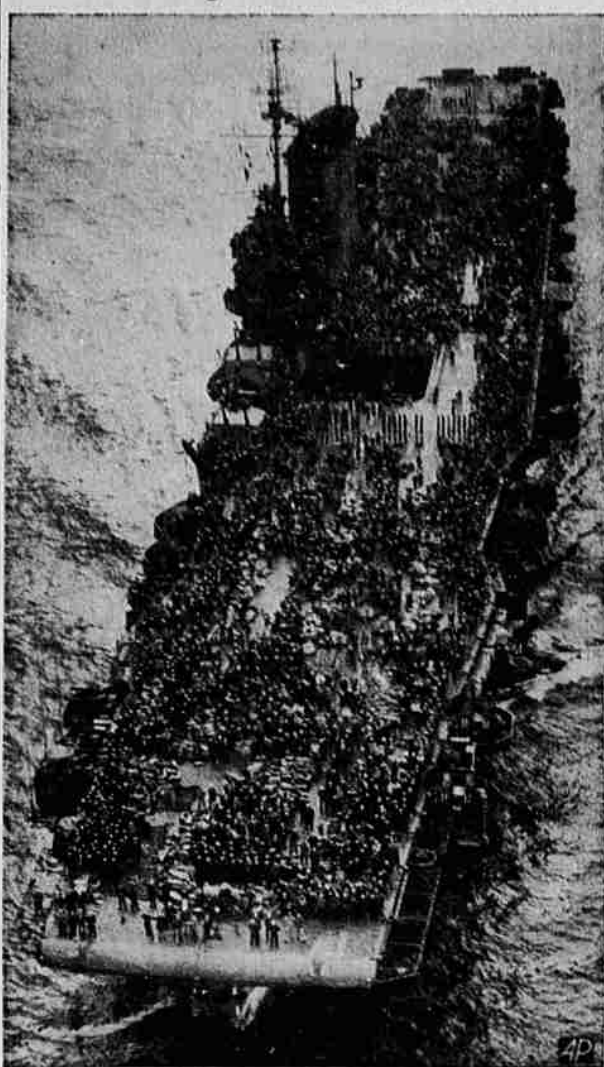

Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing ½-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

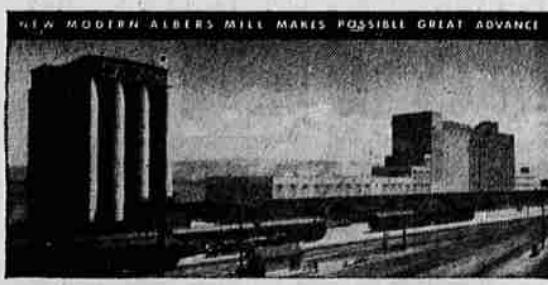
