

## PARTIES REACH AGREEMENT IN CHINA, REPORT

CHUNGKING, Sept. 20 (AP)—

The authoritative Chinese paper Ta Kung Pao reported today that Chinese government and communist negotiators were pledged to the principle of peaceful reconstruction of unified China under the leadership of Chiang Kai-shek with equality between two leading political parties.

The newspaper said "a certain agreement" had been reached and that its principal point called for an all-party conference to plan for peace and reconstruction as well as participation in the government by "all parties and groups."

Ta Kung Pao said the agreement, yet to be announced officially, contained these provisions:

Both sides deem that China has entered a period of peace and national reconstruction and civil war must not take place.

An independent, free and happy new China should build on the foundation of national unity and democracy. Therefore, all parties and groups will carry on in cooperation under the leadership of Chiang Kai-shek and on the basis of equality with the Kuomintang and the Chinese communist party.

## FURTHER TAX LEVY NEED REVEALED

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—

Three times the approved \$5,000,000 tax levy will be needed to put Portland schools in "proper" shape, the school superintendent said today.

Dr. Willard B. Spalding said in a report to the governor's interim tax survey committee that economy measures during the last 13 years have caused public school facilities to deteriorate.

With needed expenditures and expected decline in income tax funds, Spalding predicted "a very critical situation unless state funds are available."

He told the committee that a single tax for school funds seemed less advisable than the system of paying all tax funds into the treasury and appropriating school funds from that pool by legislative action.

Death of Edward Lee Smith, 57, of Riddle, by self-inflicted gunshot wound was reported today by Coroner H. C. Smith, who was reported to have been dependent over ill health, had been employed as a section worker with the Southern Pacific company for a number of years. A brother, Harvey Smith, residing at Glendale, Ore., is the only known relative.

CORVALLIS, Sept. 20 (AP)—Farmers were notified today that the hairy vetch weevil can be controlled by 3 per cent DDD dust at the rate of 25 pounds per acre. The pest, which wiped out hairy vetch seed production in the northern Willamette valley, was obliterated by DDD in agricultural experiment station tests.

## Wedding Bells Herald New Role For Shirley Temple

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 20 (AP)—Shirley Temple, 17, today began what she considers the greatest role of her life—that of Mrs. John Agar.

She married the army air forces sergeant last night in a wedding marked by one of the biggest mob scenes in Hollywood history. The former film moppet had wanted a quiet church ceremony. But her fans thought differently.

They started gathering at 3 o'clock in the afternoon in front of the Wilshire Methodist church. By the wedding time, 8:30, a crowd estimated by police at 5000 lined the streets. Traffic down Wilshire boulevard, main highway through Los Angeles, was hopelessly snarled.

**Surrounded By Guards**  
Forty-five city, studio and military policemen attempted to hold the crowd back. But they were not enough. When the bride and bridegroom left the church, a shouting throng of adolescents, middle-aged women and men nearly swamped them. A police lieutenant finally ordered an aisle through the crowd, and the couple, surrounded by eight guards, made their way to a waiting car.

If the outside was hectic, the ceremony inside was just as Shirley wanted it. The 500 invited guests sat quietly in the church, surrounded by hundreds of pink roses. Only two-thirds of the seats were taken. A blue ribbon stretched down the center aisle.

**Wore Simple Gown**  
At 8:45, Shirley took the arm of her father, George Temple, and walked calmly down the aisle. She was wearing a simple gown of white satin. On her head was a small crown of corded satin, and a long silk net veil draped over the full train.

Dr. Willis Martin conducted

an Episcopalian double ring ceremony. Shirley performed her role with the deftness of an academy ward winner. Her "I will" could be heard in the rear of the massive church. There wasn't a missed cue or a muffed line.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, Sgt. Agar gave his bride a long, resounding kiss which brought a ripple of laughter from the audience—the kiss was longer than movie censors would allow.

**Friends Present**  
The guests included few film personalities. Shirley's one-time boss, Darryl Zanuck, and her present one, David Seiznick, were present. But the majority were friends of both families, plus the rank and file of workers who have been associated with the actress in the studios.

Gov. Earl Warren and his family were among the guests. The handsome 24-year-old groom and his bride received well-wishers at the home of her parents. The reception line lasted two hours. Guests filtered through a large tent in the yard of the Temple estate and viewed the mass of presents in Shirley's play house.

**Wedding Gifts**  
A large table glittered with more than 200 pieces of sterling silver table ware. One set had 24 of each piece. There was a crystal table set with 18 of everything. Four cook books, six white blankets, an electric iron and towels of all kinds were among the gifts.

After the reception, the couple left on their honeymoon, which

## FORT MAN HIT IN UNPROVOKED ATTACK SUNDAY

FORT KLAMATH—Harold Wimer is a patient at the Hill-side hospital suffering from a fractured jaw received late Sunday night when a soldier from Fort Lewis, Wash., went berserk, striking Donald Wimer, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wimer and cutting a severe gash above his left eye in which it was necessary to take two stitches, and then turning on Wimer, striking him and breaking his jaw in two places. At the time, Wimer was working on a car belonging to the soldier, the car having been stolen from Fort Lewis and abandoned in the timber above Fort Klamath near the C. L. Blickenstaff home. Officers were called from Chiloquin by witnesses who were present, and the youth placed in custody at the Chiloquin jail. Wimer and son were immediately

ly taken to Klamath Falls for medical care.

The soldier could give no reason for his actions other than that he had been drinking, and assumed all the blame for the incident. No charges were preferred by Mrs. Wimer when the youth promised to settle the doctor and hospital bills, and he left Tuesday morning in his car for Fort Lewis, where he was due back Thursday.

Wimer's condition was reported as good as could be expected, and it is not known at this time just how long he will have to remain in the hospital. In addition to inflicting physical injuries, the soldier also broke out two windows at the garage, threatening to "blow the place up and kill three people" including Wimer and son and C. L.

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Blickenstaff, who was present at the time of the near-tragedy. He has been in the army for nearly five years, and is a veteran of considerable overseas combat duty in the South Pacific war zone.



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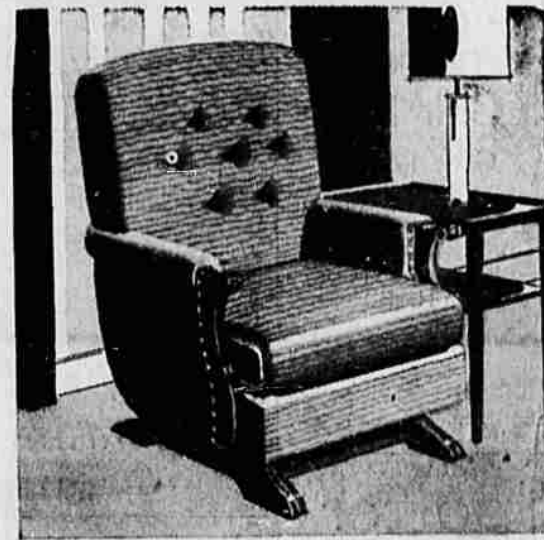
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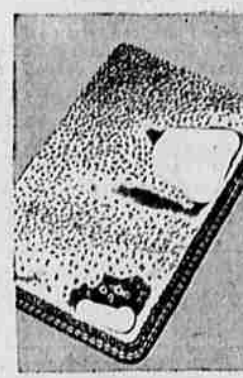
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
