scheduled to return to their jobs Monday, September 24, and all former employees are requested by the CIO to be there.

Few Pickets

In a prepared press release the CIO said, "As of this date, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Ewauna Box company, Kesterson Lumber corporation and Bly Logging company have not seen fit to comply with the request of the west coast lumber commission and consequently will not return to work until such time as an agreement has been reached with the union."

These companies cancelled their contracts with the CIO, charging the union violated the contracts. A company official indicated today that the union has not asked for meetings to consider new contracts or a return to work.

Only three pickets were on hand this morning at the CIO picket line at the entrance to the Weyerhaeuser mill as AFL machinists passed through in cars. Sheriff Lloyd L. Low and Deputies Jack Franey and Dale Mattoon were present and several state police cars were parked in the vicinity of the Weyerhaeuser entrance.

One picket with a large banner tied around his body saying, "this plant on strike" walked up and down the road but the machinists passed through without any trouble.

Council Agrees On German Policy

BERLIN, Sept. 20 (AP)—The allied control council today agreed upon an export-import policy designed to treat Germany as a single economic unit.

The agreement set forth a 10-point program intended to minimize German imports to a minimum and ensure equitable distribution of essential commodities among the four occupied zones.

Exports, except those made in payment for reparations, must be available to pay for any imports, it was decided. Imports will be limited at present to the minimum subsistence requirements as determined by each zone commander. Eventually imports will be limited to those "indispensable to the economy decided upon for occupied Germany."

Mining Pick Slayer Sought

OAKLAND, Calif., Sept. 20 (AP)—Police today sought a stealthy slayer who killed an old man with a miner's pick, then placed the fully-clothed body in bed and tucked the covers around it.

The victim was Roger S. Greene, 2nd, 75, a retired mining man.

A mining pick which he owned was missing. Police said it probably was the instrument with which the killer gouged several holes in the old man's head.

The room was not ransacked nor was there a sign of a struggle. The ground floor window was open wide, and through this the slayer may have entered and left.

Plans To 'Assure' Jobs Get Okay

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP) Legislation committing the government to policies designed to "assure" jobs for everybody cleared the senate banking committee today.

The committee voted 13 to 7 for the bill, No. 5 on President Truman's list of "must legislation."

The measure, which has bipartisan backing, lays down a policy that all Americans able and wanting to work "are entitled to an opportunity for useful, remunerative, regular, and full-time employment."

Subject to congressional appropriation, it pledges whatever federal "investment and expenditure" may be needed to assure full employment.

Allied-German Marriages Okay After October 1

BERLIN, Sept. 20 (AP)—Members of the allied occupation forces in Germany may marry Germans provided the respective commanders in chief give specific permission. The allied control council announced tonight this relaxation of the non-fraternization rules, effective October 1.

Troops may visit in German homes and have normal social relations with Germans without specific permission of their commanders. At present American troops are forbidden to enter German homes.

Troops may also be billeted with German families, provided permission is granted by the commanders.

In the case of Americans, Gen. Eisenhower will make the decision whether soldiers shall marry Germans or be billeted in German homes. He can either lay down a blanket rule or pass upon each individual case as it comes up.

time Premier Hideki Tojo soon will be moved "into the local calaboose (at Yokohama) to join the rest of his Pearl Harbor gang."

Tojo Recovers

The ex-premier is recovering from his self-inflicted bullet wound and should be ready to move in a week, Eichelberger reported. The Yokohama prefectural jail—with its small but clean cells and simple cots—already housed some 32 war-criminal suspects, and Eichelberger said he thought it was "the most interesting jail in the world today."

He said the eighth army staff was having "a hard time, at first," with the roundup, but that after MacArthur "put the problem up to the Japanese government," all we do is turn the key on them.

Smooth Occupation Speaking of the smoothness of the occupation, he pointed out that "We've naturally been hardened by years of combat, but we are not so rough that we want to mistreat civilians who obey our every demand with a bow."

"We are on the alert, however, to see that surrender terms are carried out to the letter. Does anyone think that fighting along the New Guinea axis and on the islands of the Philippine archipelago has developed a bunch of sissies?"

The Japanese already have disarmed and demobilized three-fourths of their homeland army although there are only 150,000 allied troops in Japan, thus far, to oversee the process, MacArthur's headquarters reported.

WLB Chairman Would Resign

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP) Dr. George W. Taylor today offered his resignation as chairman of the war labor board as Labor Secretary Schwelienbach sought to hold the board together by continuing it as a virtually independent agency.

Schwelienbach prepared a declaration of policy following a conference with the board enlivened by heated exchanges over WLB's future status under his direction.

The labor board, war manpower commission and U. S. employment service were shifted to the labor department by President Truman last Tuesday.

Navy Will Hold Pacific Islands

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP) The navy disclosed today its intention not to give up any specific island bases until a final decision on their disposition is made.

The disclosure was made to the house naval committee by Admiral F. J. Horne, vice chief of naval operations.

The navy has orders, Admiral Horne told the committee, not to abandon any of the bases but to keep them, at least in caretaker status, until a final determination is made with respect to what islands the United States shall control permanently.

SECURITIES OFFERED BY KAISER-FRAZER

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Kaiser-Frazer corporation will offer publicly an estimated \$18,000,000 to \$22,000,000 in securities to finance manufacture of two types of automobiles at its newly-leased plant in the huge Willow Run plant in Detroit, it was learned reliably today.

The reconstruction finance corporation will lease the Detroit property for five years, it was understood, with the newly-formed Kaiser-Frazer concern not leasing landing fields, hangers and some warehouses which Willow Run used in its aircraft operations during the war.

Negotiations are almost completed, it was reported, and it is possible a registration statement may be filed with the securities and exchange commission tomorrow.

Senate Votes Pay For Jobless To Return Home

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP) The senate voted today to pay the way back home for workers who lose the jobs they moved to during the war.

In the first administration victory after two major defeats on the unemployment compensation bill, a vote of 85 to 14 turned back a move by Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) to block the travel allowances.

The majority headed arguments that since the government induced these people to take war work away from home, it ought to get them back.

The section McClellan wanted to strip from the bill would grant up to \$200 for travel home, or to a new job. The government would pay the cost of moving the worker and his family, but not his household goods.

number 2,500,000 on July 1 next and that this would include 800,000 for occupation in the Pacific and 400,000 in Europe. The general said these figures were estimates that had to be supplied in connection with the annual budget and that later conditions would "give us a new set of figures." He did not amplify this.

Marshall said that Gen. MacArthur first had requested 17 divisions, redeployed from Europe, for duty in the Pacific but had trimmed this estimate repeatedly to finally bring it down to two redeployed divisions. These already have been sent.

Shipment Cancelled As a result of MacArthur's latest estimate, Marshall said, the army yesterday cancelled the shipment of the 13th airborne division to the Pacific. This division was ready to move out.

At the war department, additional details on the point score were announced.

The discharge score for enlisted Wacs will be reduced from 41 to 36 on October 1 and further reduced to 34 on November 1.

EXTENSION ASKED MEDFORD, Sept. 20 (AP)—Rogue River valley pear growers and shippers today asked the war department to extend length of service for German prisoners of war working in the pear harvest. County Agent Robert G. Fowler said one extension already had been granted, allowing the prisoners to stay until September 15.

Five Million Would Feel Proposed Tax-Cutting Plan

\$45 on a net income of \$2000, the plan would reduce that bill to zero.

2. An "across the board" reduction in all individual taxes, probably by 10 per cent. This would give each person a flat cut—in addition to the new system of exemptions for the normal tax. Congressional tax experts estimated the change in "normal" exemptions would reduce taxes by \$800,000,000 and that a 10 per cent "across the board" slash would cut the burdens by another \$1,200,000,000.

3. Reduction, if not repeal, of the corporation excess profits taxes.

The compromise would shoot between the policy committee's "transition period" proposal and a plan by Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) to reduce each individual's taxes by 20 per cent.

After a transition period placed from two to three years the committee proposed further relief to bring tax yields down from an estimated wartime peak of \$47,000,000,000 to between \$15,000,000,000 and \$22,000,000,000.
