

1000 ATTEND BARBECUE AT ANNUAL SHOW

An outstanding agricultural event of the year was the annual Klamath Rotary club's Junior Livestock show held Sunday and Monday of this week. Climax of the affair was a gigantic barbecue served to nearly 1000 persons.

Gib Fleet, barbecue master, presided over cooking the meat which followed an interesting process. Two black Angus steers were furnished by D. E. Alexander, cattleman and member of Rotary, from his ranch at Rock creek.

30-Foot Pit
A pit 30 feet long was dug, and lined with rocks to hold the heat. Sunday evening the fire was built, replenished and watched through the night and at 4 a. m., the meat was put in. The meat was first wrapped in muslin and then bound in chicken wire through which metal rods were thrust for lifting. Hides were then wrapped around the bundles of meat and these were wrapped in wet burlap. A bulldozer covered over the pit with earth, and 13 hours later it was lifted out by a crane from a Copco truck and conveyed over to the serving tables. The barbecue was served at 3:30 p. m. Monday.

Fleet is a protege of the late Joe Shirko who was famous for barbecues throughout the northwest.

L. A. West, granddaddy of the Klamath Junior Livestock shows, was present, superintending the 10th annual show this year, sponsored by Klamath Rotary club. Lee Jacobs of Baker, former Klamath Rotarian, came down to assist with the public-address system announcing.

Truman Favors Joint Study Of Atom, Senators Report

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—President Truman is reported to favor a joint senate-house study of development and control of atomic energy.

The president is said to have told a delegation of three senators today that he favors establishment of a joint committee, such a committee of 12 has been proposed by Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.).

Talk With Truman
Vandenberg, Chairman Generally (D-Tex.) of the foreign relations committee and Senator

Lucas (D-Ill.) talked over procedure with Mr. Truman.

The visitors said there was no discussion of whether this country should attempt, along with Britain and Canada, to keep the secret of the atomic bomb. Mr. Truman may shed some light on that question in a message to congress soon.

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Hear Truman's Ideas
They simply told reporters that they had called to familiarize themselves with the president's thinking along the lines of the future use and control not only of the atomic bomb but of atomic energy.

Several bills dealing with the atomic energy question pending before the committee and the three were directed by that group to talk over the general situation with the president.

BLOOD TYPE TESTS RESULTS REVEALED

CANON CITY, Colo., Sept. 20 (AP)—Successful conclusion of 35-day experiments to develop a universal blood type, conducted among the inmates of Colorado state prison, who volunteered as "guinea pigs," was announced today by Maj. L. H. Tisdale of New York.

The convicts received transfusions of whole blood, then submitted to periodic checks to determine the reaction. Tisdale said none suffered any "lasting ill effects."

The experiments conducted by the army studied methods of using group O donor blood universally, and adapting other blood types to the group. Major Tisdale said the army would share the technical knowledge for the benefit of civilians.

One hundred thirty-four inmates volunteered to participate in the experiments; 49 were selected to provide the blood donations.
