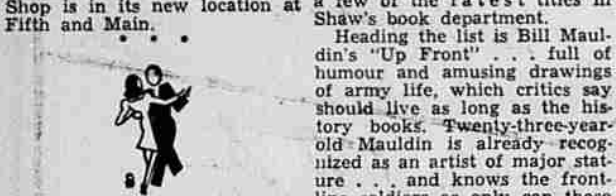

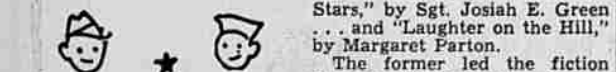

NAVY POST MAY AID MORSE IN DOCK DEMANDS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Appointment of Senator Morse (R-Ore.) to the naval committee may give added weight to his demands for a modern repair dock at Portland, Ore.

Senator Morse had to give up his place on the commerce committee to take the navy post vacated by the death of Senator Johnson (R-Calif.), but he told a reporter he thought it was well worth while.

Asked Recognition

Morse and Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) have been urging for several months that the navy recognize Portland as a major repair base. They have told the navy they will be satisfied with nothing less than a 14,000-16,000-ton steel dock. Several of these, Morse says, have been declared surplus property.

Repair facilities, the navy told the senators just before the summer recess, are determined by the number of naval vessels using a port. On his return to Washington, Morse wrote Navy Secretary Forrestal that the formula was "but an attempt of the navy to raise itself by its own bootstraps."

He asked "whether the navy is going to take some steps it should take in cooperation with Port of Portland officials toward correcting some of the injustice that has been done against the port."

Would Give Employment

A 16,000-ton repair dock at Portland, he told Forrestal, is one way in which the federal government can be of assistance in alleviating a "very serious postwar problem."

This problem, he explained, is the employment of a large number of ship repairmen who went to Oregon from all over the country to be trained during the war and who have expressed a desire to remain in the northwest.
